

Verdun has always been looked upon with interest by the British race, for it was there that our civilians were imprisoned at the time of the Napoleonic war. For a time they enjoyed their internment, and were allowed a good deal of liberty. Horse racing and kindred sports were permitted on those very plains where the Germans have been attacking, but under Wirim's regime those concessions were withdrawn, and the plight of the prisoners affords the most painful reading in all that melancholy period. They were taxed out of all comparison to their means, and those who were unable to pay were often cast into dungeons, where they lingered until death came as a release. 
A Nicely Chosen Word.
