The monthly Day of Prayer on behalf of our soldiers and sailors at war, will be held in the Lecture Room of the Methodist Church next Thursday, November 22. There will be sessions at 10.30, 2.30, 3.30, 4.30 and 7.30. Friends of all denominations are welcome.

Speakers at the Victory Loan Bonds Meeting to-morrow, Friday evening in the Masonic Hall will tell all about them. The speakers will be Lieut.-Col. Williams, Mr. Wm. Keith, reeve of Newmarket, and Mr. W. J. Hill registrar. Don't fail to be present. Chair taken at 8 o'clock.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Minister of Labor in the Laurier Government, was unanimously nominated as a straight Laurier candidate for the House of Commons at a largely attended meeting of the North York Reform Association, held in Newmarket Saturday afternoon.

Endean Bros., under instructions of the Richmond Hill Horticultural Society, have set out a hedge of dwarf barberry on the north, south and west side of the Public School grounds. The Horticultural Society is to be commended for leading the way for civic improvement.

Mr. W. L. Pease of Montreal, President of the Canadian Bankers' Association, has written to Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance, saying that the Chartered Banks will lend money on Dominion of Canada Victory Bonds. The banks will advance up to 90 per cent. of the face value of the bonds. The rate of interest is 5 1/2 per cent. per annum.

Mr. John Dunlop has just returned from the Cleveland, Ohio, Floral Exhibition, where he was very successful in exhibiting his new Red Seedling Rose, "Mrs. Henry Winnett," taking five first and two second prizes. He also won a silver and a bronze medal, being the highest awards. One of the coveted prizes was for a basket of 100 roses arranged for effect. The Winnett Rose was used in this, and won first prize against six other competitors.

Frank M. Dunlop made application in New York for enlistment in the Royal Flying Corps and passed his preliminary examination before the British Recruiting Mission successfully; also his final examination in Toronto, being the first cadet to take the equilibrium test, which has recently been adopted in Canada. He left for Camp Borden on Tuesday to take his military training. On his return to Toronto he will be quartered at Burwash Hall for further training, and finally at the Aviation Camp in Texas.

**The Study of Agriculture**

Farmers and students of Agriculture will be interested in learning that for their convenience much of the matter embodied in the three-volume annual report of the Dominion Experimental Farms, has been published in separate divisional form. The subjects dealt with in the series are the reports of the Dominion Animal Husbandman, of the Dominion Cerealists, of the Dominion Horticulturist, of the Supervisor of Illustration Stations of the Dominion Apiarist and of the Husbandman. In these pamphlets that can be had free on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, tables of statistics and records and tests made in all the different branches referred to are supplied.

**Rural Planning and Development**

The latest report of the Commission of Conservation deals with the important subject of planning the development of rural districts and small towns in Canada. It has been prepared by Mr. Thomas Adams, Town Planning Adviser of the Commission, who has made a close study of the problems of rural development of this country during the past three years, following 25 years in farming, land surveying and tree planting in other countries.

The report deals comprehensively with the social conditions and tendencies in rural areas and the prevailing systems of land settlement and development. It indicates the rural problems requiring solution in order to secure the proper development and economic use of land for purposes of efficiency, health, convenience and amenity. The great injury which land development in Canada suffers from speculation, neglect of public health, and want of expert business administration of land settlement, is considered. Incidentally, the problem of returned soldiers is dealt with, and the connection between land and development and such questions as taxation, unemployment, high cost of living is clearly shown.

Having regard to the need for more attention being given to production in Canada; to the extent to which production is impaired by speculation in land, by neglect of public health and by haphazard systems of development; to the importance of increasing the supply of human skill and energy and of capital derived from production instead of by borrowing; the problems dealt with in this report are of vital and current interest to the people of this country.

There are five appendices by competent authorities, and the concluding chapter gives an outline of proposals and makes general recommendations to cover the conditions as presented.

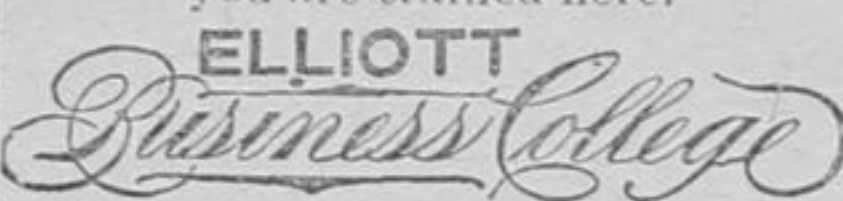
