Citizens' Meeting

A citizen's meeting was held in the Council Chamber Friday evening, Mr. Pratt. President of the Ratepayers Association, in the chair. The President stated that the object of the meeting was to enlist the co-operation of the citizens with the Village Council for a Field Day, to tender a reception to returned soldiers, and to start a fund for a Memorial to our boys who had fallen in war.

It was then decided to hold a day of sports, &c, on the 4th of August-Toronto's Civic Holiday.

A motion was carried asking the Agricultural Society and other societies here to co-operate with the citizens in making the entertainment of the 4th of August a success.

Mr. Pratt was appointed Permanent Chairman, Mr. McMahon, Secretary, and Mr. Greene, treasurer.

Village Council.

The Council met on July 2, 1919, in the Clerk's office, all the numbers present, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. A by-law to borrow \$25,000 and provide for the issuing of Debentures as collateral security for the same was given its first reading. Five petitions for sidewalks were read and on motion were received, each heing certified by the Clerk as sufficient under the Local Improvement Act. Moved by Councillor Hill seconded by Councillor Monkman and carried that work he proceeded with at once on Wright street westward from Yonge to Hall, Dufferin avenue from Yonge eastward to Church, east side, and on Yonge, east side from Lorne Ave. northward to Moodie's lot,

The Clerk was instructed to write Mr. Bert Jackson re well. Some discussion was had relating to a Field Day in the near future and a decision made to endeavour to have a ratepayer's meeting on Friday evening, July 4

Farmhouse Burned

During the absence of the family, the farmhouse belonging to Richard Ash, a short distance north of the village of Unionville, caught fire and was in a short time burned to the ground, together with a large part of the contents. Mr. and Mrs. Ash, together with some of the other members of the family, were in Markham, while two of the sons were in the back field drawing in hay.

Little from the upstairs was saved and the loss is heavy. Two of the sons had only recently returned from the front, and the gold watches donated by the township of Markham and presented to each of them a day or two before were destroyed in the fire. The favorable wind prevented the bank barn, one of the best in the township, from igniting. The neighbors from far and near rendered splendid service.
