Drowned in Patterson Pond

Patterson Pond had its first drowning accident last Saturday, when Jack Tweedie, of Toronto, thirteen years of age, lost his life while bathing with sixteen other boys at the Y. M. C. A. Camp.

The lad uttered a cry, and his disappearance was noticed neither by his companions nor by the two swimming instructors who were with the boys. Not until the boys had all left the water did any one remark on Tweedie's absence. Then the water was dragged and six hours later the body was discovered in water less than three feet deep. Coroner Wesley, of Newmarket, after examining the body, declared that nothing could have been done by his companions to aid him in any way. The lad was dead, he said, before he even sank below the surface. No water was found in his lungs.

Mr. F. T. Graham, who is in charge of the camp, stated that this is the first drowning to occur in any Y. M. C. A. Camp. Patterson pond is an ideal spot for a camp, and much regret is expressed over the distressing accident.

The men were banquetted in the drill shed, and in the evening by the ladies of Aurora.

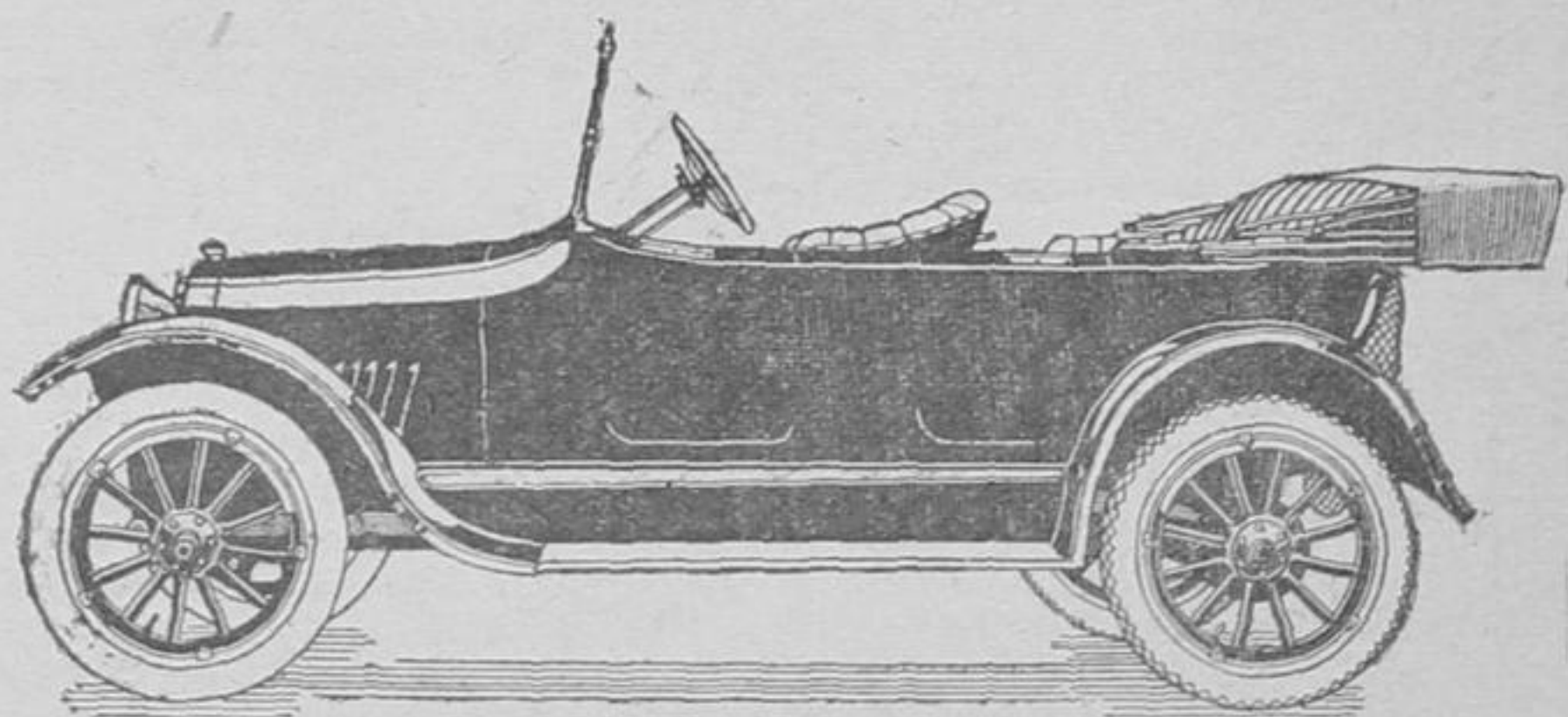
