Letter from England

London, Eng. Sept. 5th, 1919.
Dear Mr. McMahon,
Richmond Hill, Ont.

May I through your columns send a message to my friends in York county from the far off motherland. It has been a great privilege to come to this old land the home of our ancestors and to move about the places where the men lived and acted out their well spent lives, who did so much to make our nation both loved and feared in the wide world and who gave to all other lands the best and noblest inspiration of life and service.

I have spent scarcely a week in this great city, not long enough to enable me to learn much or to study the complex situation to be found here. Short as it has been though one can but see how serious is the position of the people of Great Britain, and to realize that difficult and complex as are our Canadian problems those of the motherland are both larger and more involved.

As I understand the duties of citizenship the fact that our national and provincial questions will be less difficult to deal with does not permit us to shirk any of the burden they impose, rather should they incite us to take them in hand with a mental grip which is resolute for the best and earliest settlement of them. Such a course on our part will by its example and influence stimulate the people of Great Britain to greater determination to definitely grapple with their greater problems.

I make free to remind our people that not less real may and should be the service which we in the Overseas Dominions can render to the Empire during the years of peace reconstruction, by honest and faithful citizen service giving therein wise and true leadership both to the Empire and not less to all the nations and peoples to whom our soldiers and brothers gave like example upon the blood stained battle fields of France and Flanders.

In view of such responsibility I make free to urge our people in Canada the service they can render the Empire by doing their part in the pending vote for permanency of prohibition and also to honestly do their part as they understand it in the ensuing provincial elections. I much regret my absence at this realizing as I do the importance of the results that will be attained.

May I add a word in respect to the candidates selected both for the provincial elections and for that which we believe must follow in the near future for the Dominion elections.

The information which had made known to us the altogether disproportionate representation of different classes of our people should lead to careful consideration of their character and work.

One mighty reason why I supported woman's suffrage was because I was ashamed of the mess men had made of legislation. Knowing as we now do that out of about only five thousand lawyers in Canada they form nearly one-fifth of the number of representatives in the different legislative bodies of our country. I can but conclude that as a body of representatives they have been very far short in the service they were in duty bound to render to our people. This in part, mayhap, because they necessarily fail to clearly understand the needs of the larger classes whose interests were in their hands, or if they did understand, then the guilt of wilful neglect outweighed that of ignorance.

As a responsible elector I have come to a decision that I cannot vote and work for a lawyer candidate whoever he may be. As a member of the United Farmers of Ontario I would be pleased to see a suitable candidate chosen from their ranks, or failing such choice, then either a competent labor or woman candidate who will justify my support.

One condition only would I require, viz., that whoever it may be shall give unflinching support to all prohibitory legislation that may come before the House.

Hoping to learn of a large majority for retention of our Ontario Temperance Act.
