The Rainbow's Sound.

Incredible as it may seem, a beam of light can be made to produce sound. A ray of sunshine is thrown through a lens on to a glass vessel containing lampblack, colored silk or worsted, or any like substance. A disk having slits or openings cut in it is made to revolve swiftly in this beam of light, so as to "cut it up," thus causing alternate flashes of light and shadow. When one places his ear to the glass vessel he hears strange sounds so long as the flashing beam falls upon the vessel.

A still more extraordinary effect is produced when the beam of sunlight is made to pass through a prism so as to produce what is called the solar spectrum. The disk is turned and the colored light of the rainbow is made to break through it. Now if the ear be placed to the vessel containing the silk or other material, as the colored lights of the spectrum fall upon it, sounds will be given out by the different parts of the spectrum, and there will be silence in other parts.

For instance, if the vessel contains red worsted and the green light flashes upon it, loud sounds will be given forth. Only feeble sounds will be heard when the red and the blue parts of the rainbow fall upon the vessel. Other colors will produce no sounds at all. Green silk gives out sound best in a red light. Every kind of material gives more or less sound in different colors and no sound at all in others.

Decorated by Both Sides.

One of the leading generals of Emir Feisal's Arabian army is named Jaafar, says a contributor to the Red Cross Magazine. He is a huge Arab, who rides a tremendous horse, and in the early days of the war he commanded a division that played havoc with the British at Gallipoli. For this the Germans gave him the Iron Cross and sent him to command the Senussi in Egypt, where one day the Dorset Yeomanry cut through his troops and captured the great Jaafar himself.

When he had been a prisoner at Cairo for eight months, Emil Feisal, the Arab, decided to join the Allies, and Jaafar begged the British to release him and let him fight in Feisal's army. The plea was granted, and Jaafar fought as valiantly on the side of the men whom he had opposed at Gallipoli that the British gave him the Cross of St. Michael and St. George. "I've thrown my Iron Cross away," he said, when he was awarded the British decoration.

Britain's Newest Sea Giant.

H.M.S. Hood has just left the Clyde, says a London despatch. She will replace the Queen Elizabeth as flagship of the Atlantic fleet. Possibly the new Hood will be the last of her kind; it is certain no other will be delivered in the next four years.

The giant vessel, held officially to be a perfect blend of battleship and battle cruiser, represents the naval architect's idea of a practical realization of an ideal fighting ship. She embodies all the lessons of the war. She is 860 feet long, with a displacement of 41,200 tons, has a horse-power of 144,000 and a designed speed of 31 knots. Her main armament consists of eight 15 inch guns and her secondary armament of twelve 5.5 inch and four 4 inch anti-aircraft guns. Her full load of oil fuel is 4,000 tons. A "blister" renders her unsinkable by any existing torpedo. When completed for sea the Hood will have cost \$30,000,000, and the annual cost of her maintenance in commission will be \$2,500,000.
