Z. A. Lush, K. C., head of the well-known law firm in Toronto, and director of many large corporations, died at his home in the city Saturday evening.

The following note, over the signature of W. N. Wilkinson, Toronto, has come to hand: Six million Jews are starving to death in Eastern Europe. Eight hundred thousand children are without food and clothing. This suffering can be relieved only through the generosity of people living in countries which have not suffered from the great war. In the United States recently \$35,000,000 was raised through an appeal for funds to assist these suffering people. An appeal is made in Canada, under the guidance of Sir Mortimer Davis of Montreal for funds with which to buy food and clothing.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie has been appointed Minister of Militia, in place of Hon. Mr. Mewburn. Mr. Guthrie will also retain the position of Solicitor-General.

A train wreck occurred near North Bay Sunday morning. A train on the C. P. R. ran into another train which was stalled, owing to the failure of the engine to make steam under a frost of 30 degrees below zero. Fifteen persons were killed and many were injured.

Epworth League

Mr. Lauder Glass, chairman of the Citizens' Department, presided at the weekly meeting Monday evening. After the opening exercises, a vocal solo by Miss W. Hume, and an instrumental selection by Miss O. Mortson, the address of the evening was given by Mr. Jos. Reid, B.A., L.L.B., of Toronto. The subject was "Canadian Patriots, Who They Are and What We Owe Them."

The first part of the lecture was to the boys and girls, many of whom were before him. He reminded them that they now stood on the threshold of responsibility; that the door of opportunity was open to them; that a person's word should be equal to his bond. He advised the boys and girls to read only good books, and to avoid the cigarette and cigar. Tobacco he classed as the twin vice of strong drink.

Preachers, teachers and parents are in a position to do much work as patriots, and many take advantage of their opportunities. He touched on Germany's humiliation, but proved conclusively that Britain was justified in the part she took in the war. He referred with pride to the noble sacrifices our Canadian boys had made for the sake of their home and friends, and described the condition of Canada as a German colony, had Germany won the war.

Mr. Reid touched on politics, and did not hesitate to show how he intended voting at the next election.

Mr. McKee, in moving a vote of thanks, said that while he could not endorse all that he heard, it was a most able lecture, and contained much that was worthy of remembrance. Mr. Wellman seconded a hearty vote of thanks.
