#### Rev. James O'Hara Dead

Rev. James O'Hara, one of the oldest Methodist ministers in Canada, died Sunday at the residence of Rev. J. R. Aikenhead, 1836 Davenport road, in his 85th year. For 55 years he had been an ordained minister in Canada, and in that time had charge of nearly 20 stations. He was born in Ulster County, Ireland, in 1835, came to Canada at the age of 25 years, when he started his clerical training at Victoria College, Cobourg, later taking up his work with the Methodist Church. He retired 25 years ago and settled in Peterboro, later moving to Toronto. He was twice married and leaves one son, Frederick, of Seattle.
