Death of Charles Savage

Many friends here received a shock when they learned of the death of Mr. Charles T. Savage at his home in Toronto Friday night. He had been ailing several weeks, but appeared to be improving, and his sudden death was quite unexpected. He was born in Richmond Hill 55 years ago, and after leaving the Patterson Works, entered the employ of the Massey-Harris Company, Toronto, rising to the position of foreman of one of the departments. He was an active member of Chalmers Presbyterian church, a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters, but was better known as Bandmaster of the 109th Regiment Band. The funeral on Monday afternoon was headed by the 109th Band, and interment took place in Prospect Cemetery, the service being conducted by Rev. S. Fulton, of Chalmers church. Besides four brothers—Peter G., John, James and Andrew—deceased is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Flora Coulter, one son, Russell, and one daughter, Mrs. G. W. West. Few men were more deservedly popular than Charlie Savage, and it is needless to say his wife and other relatives have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of friends.
