

Tuesday's Globe, in an editorial note, says:  
 "The United States winter wheat report for May 1 indicates a yield of one-third less than in 1919, which is one more reason why Canadian farmers should raise all they can in the coming season."

The above is good advice, but The Globe might help production more by trying to show Mayor Church and the City Council that they are doing the farmers an injustice by encouraging farm hands to quit work an hour earlier in the evening than the usual time.

The Town Council of Newmarket has compromised on the so called daylight saving scheme by asking the citizens to observe the new time from Sunday, May 30, to Saturday, Sept. 4. The citizens see that the plan causes confusion and adds greatly to the general unrest of the people, but they fall into line, owing to the Metropolitan Railway following Toronto time. One of the local papers says: "The worst feature is the way that the fast time hits the pupils of the

high school who use the Metropolitan line, as at present they get here 15 minutes to 8 and have to wait an hour for school to open. Then in the afternoon they have to lose an hour of teaching or wait in town till the 7 o'clock car going north."

We are not prepared to say that \$1,400 a session is enough for each private member of the Legislature for his indemnity, but we do say that Premier Drury is to be commended for opposing and refusing to have anything to do with the Round Robin that was signed by a majority of the members, asking for a raise of \$1,100. We hear a great deal these days about Democracy. Democracy means government by the people. Did the people—the electors—give their candidates a mandate to raise their annual salary from \$1400 to \$2500? If those members of Parliament who spoke in favor of the increase will tell their electors before the next election that they purpose voting for it they need not be accused of deception. That, they did not do before the last election.

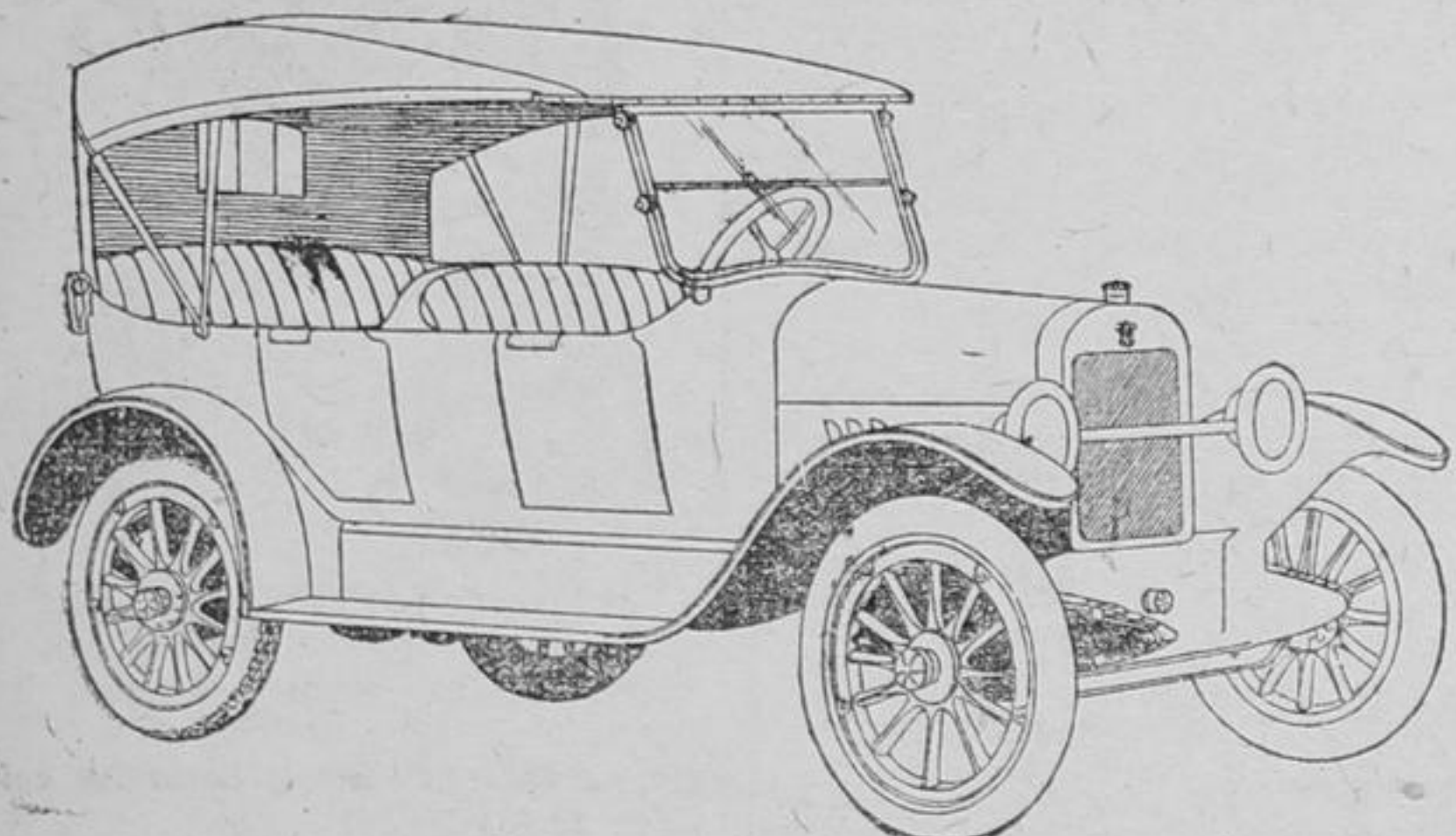
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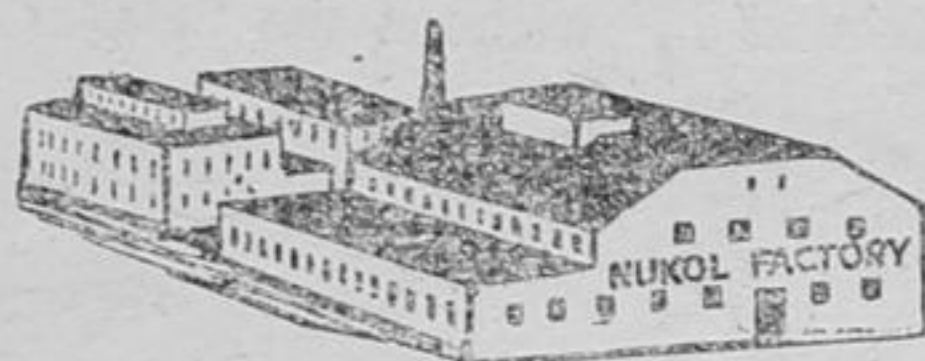

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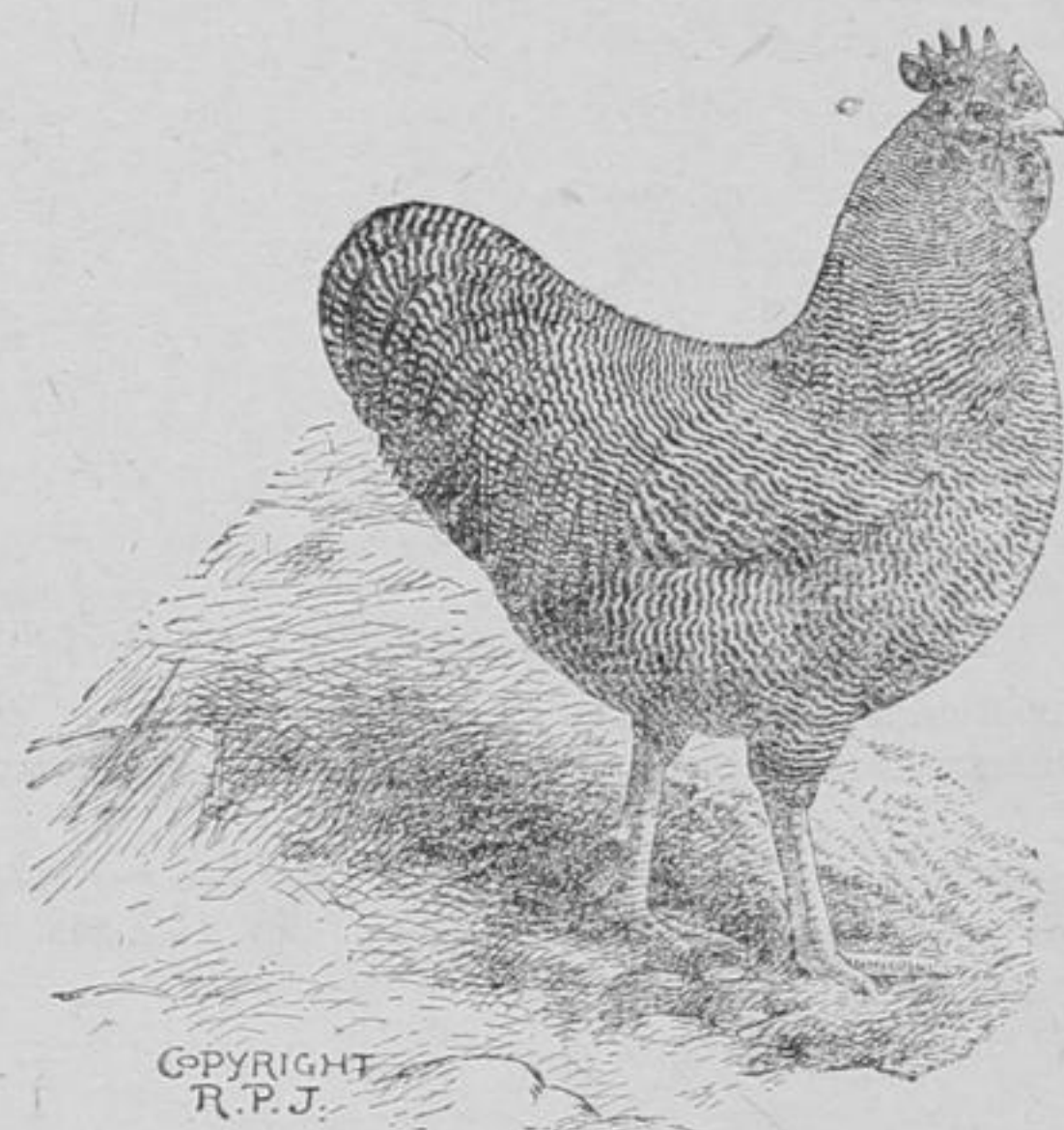
