NEWS NOTES

Sir William Meredith, Chief Justice, on Friday was sworn in as acting Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario during the absence of Hon. Lionel Clarke. The Lieutenant-Governor left last week for Western Canada and will return about the end of October.

The only comfort in the snowstorm of Friday morning is the knowledge that only on two occasions in a period of seventy years has there been snow earlier in the fall. In 1860, it snowed on September 25th, and 1918, the flakes commenced to fall on September 26.

A meeting of York County Medical Association took place in Stouffville on Tuesday of last week. There was a large attendance of members and two very interesting addresses were heard, one on "Fractures" by Dr. N. A. Powell, Toronto, and the other on "Organization," by Dr. Rontley, Secretary of the Ontario Medical Association.

Death of Edgar Redditt

Edgar Redditt, son of the late Benjamin Redditt of this village, passed away at his home in Barrie last Thursday night. Although he had been in failing health since his return from overseas he was able to be at his work until a week ago, and the end came very unexpectedly. Born in Richmond Hill forty-two years ago, he learned the printing trade at The Liberal Office and subsequently worked in Toronto and Owen Sound before going to Barrie some seventeen years ago. He proved himself a very capable newspaperman, doing excellent work for The Examiner. Balancing in 1915, he organized and took overseas the band of the 157th Battalion. On his return from overseas he again took up his position on the staff of The Barrie Examiner.

He was a member of the Masonic Fraternity and of Collier Street Methodist Church. His wife and one son survive him, also the following brothers and sisters: Ernest, Rolph and Benjamin of Toronto, Stanley of Winnipeg, and Misses Bessie and Greta of Toronto.

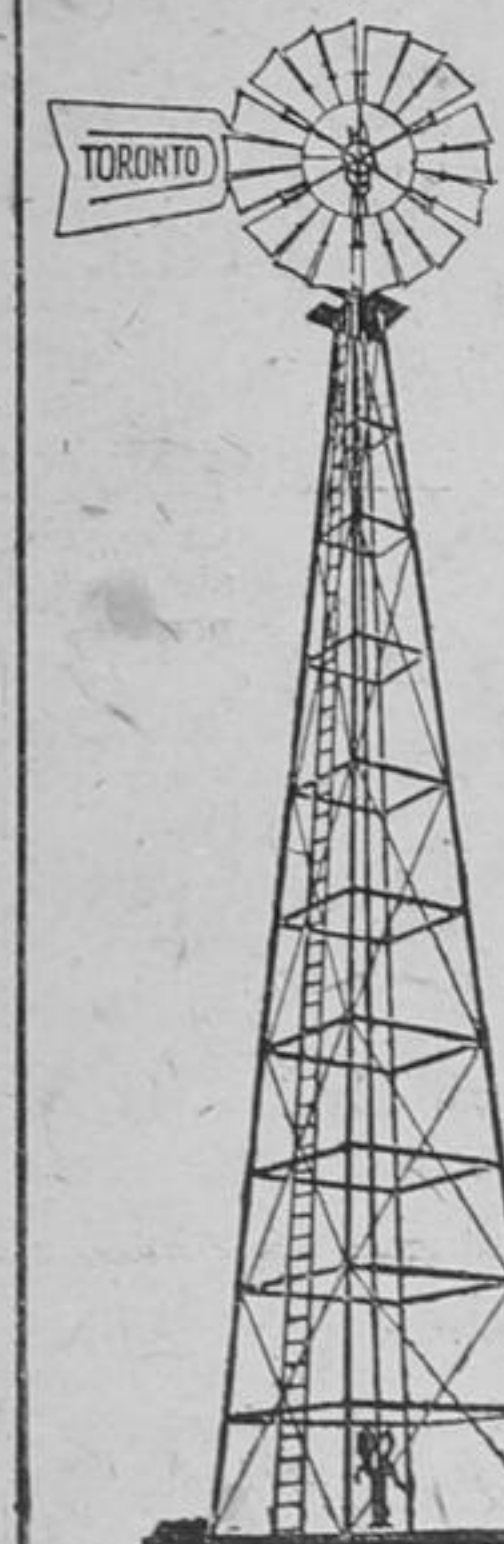
