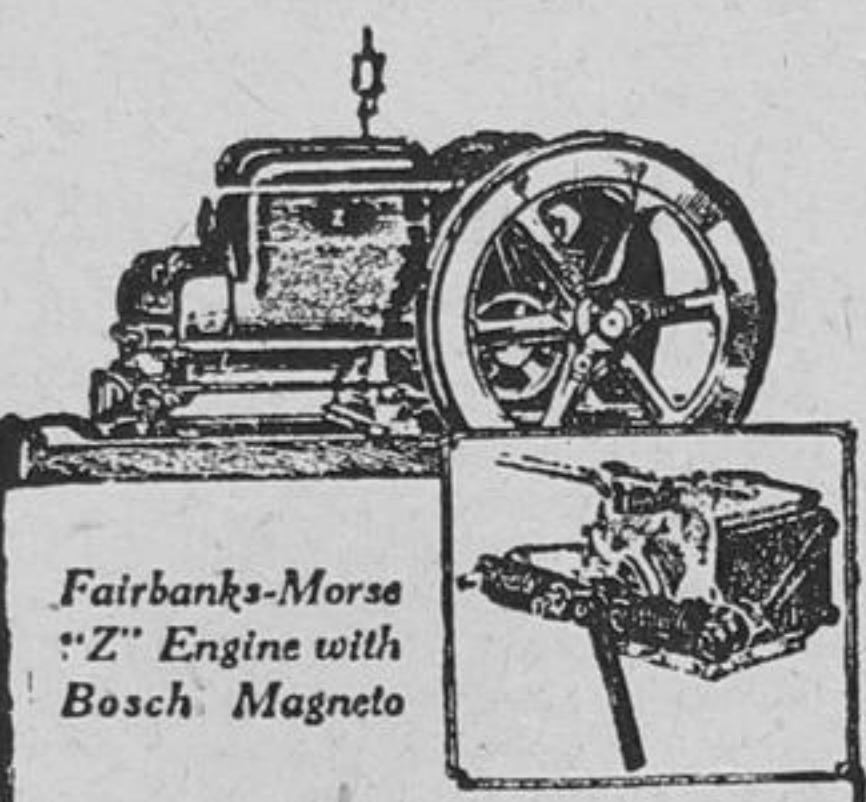

Growth of the Grain Elevator

The grain elevator system has grown enormously in Canada and developed rapidly in the last few years. This growth and development have so far been mainly confined to the Prairie Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta, but the system is attracting more and more attention in the other provinces, particularly in Ontario, where several wheat growing and shipping centres, notably Toronto, are agitating for the erection of elevators. Nor is it only in numbers that the system has extended but the increase in size has been such that some of the structures can fairly be termed mammoth, such for instance as those at the head of the lakes. There are, according to Hon. George Langley, Minister of Municipal Affairs for Saskatchewan, not fewer than 3,600 elevators in the three provinces referred to, from 40 to 60 feet high and capable of storing from 20,000 to 30,000 bushels a piece on the average, a few reaching to twice the greatest enumerated capacity. In other words upwards of 110,000,000 bushels of wheat can thus be stored at the one time. These facts and figures are taken from an interesting article by Mr. Langley in the September number of the Agricultural Gazette of Canada. By the terms of the Canada Grain Act, the owners of the elevators, mostly private individuals or incorporated companies, are compelled to accept all grain offered by farmers, unless wet or unstorable with safety, hence the general and common use of the system. The elevators are all licensed by, and are under the supervision of the Board of Grain Commissioners of Canada.
