The sod was in excellent condition for a match, but the stubble field, owing to the heavy rains, was inclined to be soft and muddy. Much of the work, however, was very creditable, and the men were complimented by many old plowmen present.

The men and boys attended closely to business, but stopped long enough to enjoy the tempting lunch which was served to them by the well known local bakers—Robeson and Roberts.
