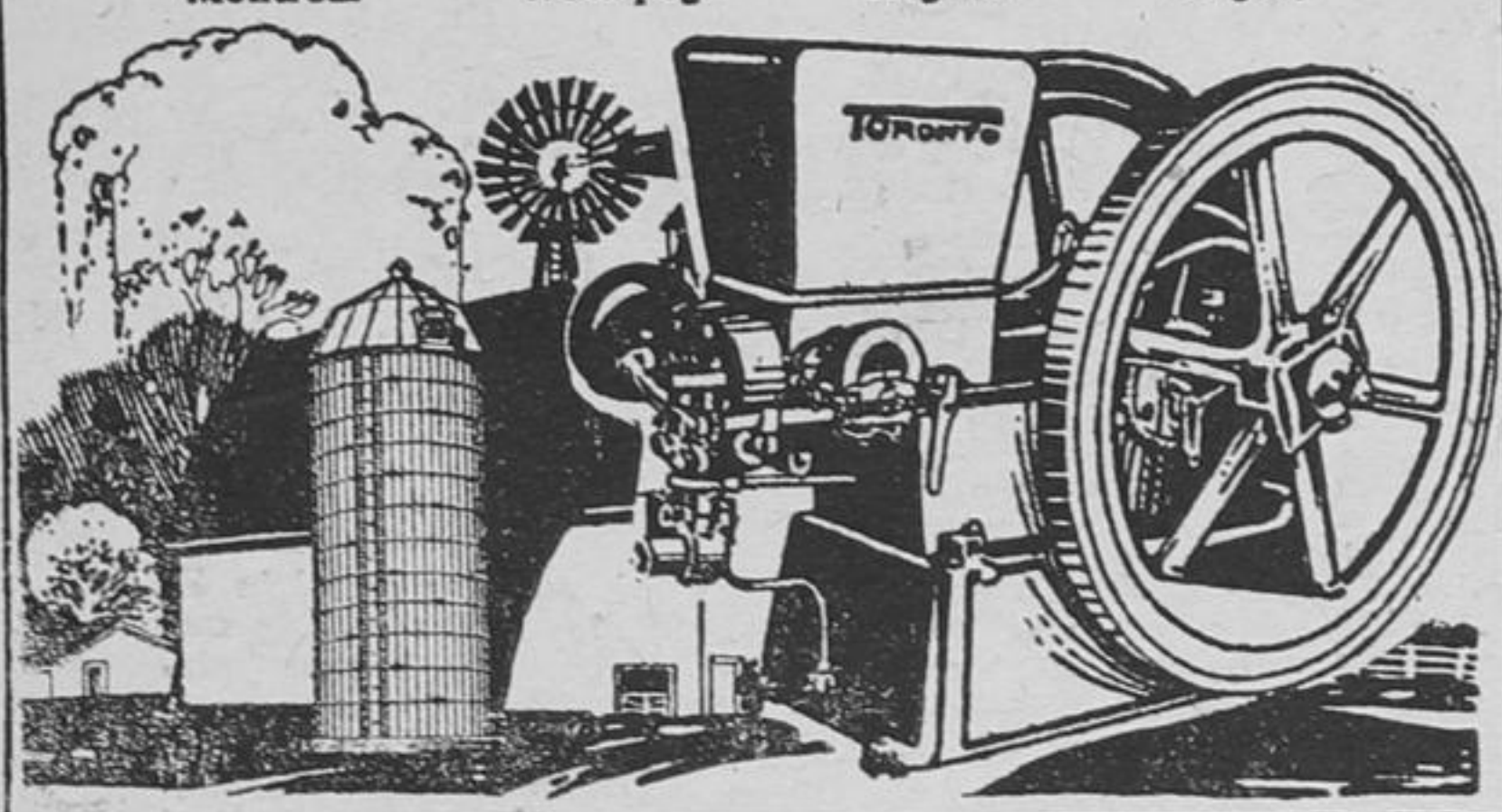

It is suggested by some of our educationists that boxing, otherwise known as the manly art of self-defense, be taught in the Public Schools of Ontario. Boxing between boys of equal weight, strength and ability is good amateur sport, if the combatants hold their temper, and have a desire for fair play. But if boxing should be added to the school curriculum there would be great danger of the big bullies wiping the floor with those of weaker bodies. Yes, we admit there is sport in boxing, but frequently the sport is all on one side. Pupils now-a-days have quite enough subjects to think about. Let the so-called manly art take care of itself.

A man at Mimico was convicted by the local magistrate on the charge of shingling his house on a Sunday. The case was appealed and taken before James Haverson K. C., and the former conviction was squashed. Mr. Haverson claimed that had the man been a carpenter or builder it would have been unlawful to shingle his house on the Lord's Day, but as he was a teamster the act was not punishable. In other words a man may work all day on the Sabbath, if the work he does on the Sabbath is not his ordinary every day work. According to Mr. Haverson's ruling, all that men have to do, who wish to escape the Lord's Day Act, is to do any other work than their regular calling. For instance, from a legal standpoint, it would be quite safe for doctors and barbers to change work every Sunday, but it might be hard on the patients and customers.

WHERE TO ERECT A MEMORIAL

At a sitting of York County Council 11 last week, a motion was carried authorizing a committee to procure an option on a small piece of land at York Mills as a site on which to erect a memorial to the men of York County who fell in the Great War. We understand the exact spot is on the brow of York Mills hill, west of Yonge street, on the Gordon McKay property, directly south of the Mausoleum. Although now in York township, in all probability this property in a few years will be within the City limits.

From a county standpoint, the proposed location looks like a mistake. At one time it was actually suggested by some of the southern members of the Council that the monument be erected in Queen's Park. That would certainly be an ideal spot if the memorial were in honor of Toronto soldiers, but the proposal is purely a county matter.

We never could see why the Bond Lake site was abandoned. This place is practically central for the county, on one of the greatest thoroughfares in Canada, along the line of an electric railway, where thousands of people visit Bond Lake Park every season. But if Bond Lake site is not considered desirable, we submit that Morgan's Hill, half a mile south of Thornhill would be preferable to York Mills. A monument, such as will no doubt be erected, would be seen on Morgan's Hill for many miles in every direction, and the view of the farm country from that point cannot be beaten in any other part of the County.

Interesting Facts Regarding Fox Raising

Some interesting facts regarding fox farming are forthcoming from the Veterinary Director General, Dr. Torrance. In an article in The Agricultural Gazette of Canada for November he tells us that the main difficulty connected with the raising of foxes in captivity is the protecting of them from disease. It is noticeable that the female instead of giving birth to a litter of four or five at a time, as she does when free, rarely produces more than two, the average for the farms in Prince Edward Island being at the rate of one and a half. Individual fox ranchers, however, by care and improved methods do succeed in securing an increase of three or even four per pair. With a view to making this success more general, under the direction of Dr. Torrance, research work has been undertaken. Land and equipment have been acquired, two scientific experts from the Health of Animals Branch employed, six pairs of foxes from the Island ranches furnished, and a small laboratory fitted up for the studying of the diseases and parasites that affect the animals.

Ex-Warden Pugsley Honored

Monday's Globe had a good photograph of Mr. W. H. Pugsley, above the following paragraph: Veteran York Councillor who was presented with an English oak cane by York county friends at the Walker House. For twenty-five years Mr. Pugsley was the Reeve of Richmond Hill, and though he has retired from the council he still represents York Roads Commission. Ex-Warden Pugsley is one of the men who framed the Met. Ry. agreement, and he is proud of it. It is owing to him that York County meets in the old building on Adelaide street rather than at the City Hall.
