Died in the Hospital

Deceased lived on the old homestead and was one of the prominent farmers of the Township. He was a Justice of the Peace, superintendent the Methodist Sunday School, a member of the Official Board. He was of an amiable disposition and was highly respected by all who knew him. The funeral on Sunday was very large, many coming from a distance to show their last tribute of esteem. The service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. McNeill who in an earnest sermon spoke words of comfort to the sorrowing family. Deceased is survived by his widow, four sons and two daughters.

BY-LAW NUMBER

To authorize the granting of certain fixed assessments and exemptions with regard to certain properties within the Village of Richmond Hill-

Whereas certain industries have located within the said Municipality and it is expedient that the said industries should be encouraged by the granting of certain privileges and exemptions, Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill enacts as follows:

1st. That the Inrig Shoe Company, Limited, be, and it is hereby granted a fixed assessment of \$2,750.00 on the premises owned by the said Company on the East side of Yonge street being known as Let No. 371 according to a plan of the said Village made by C. Reuben, said fixed Assessment to be for a period of 15 years.

2nd. That Mr. J. H. Dunlop be granted a fixed assessment of \$3,000.00 on the eastern portion of his property, being Lot No. 335 according to said Plan, and consisting of about twenty acres, for a period of 10 years, and also that for the same term of 10 years the glass houses and other buildings used by him in the carrying on of his business as Florist be exempt from Taxation, other than taxes levied for school purposes.

3rd. That for the term of 10 years Harold J. Mills be, and he is hereby granted exemption from taxation, other than for school purposes, upon the glass houses and other buildings used by him in his business as Florist.

4th. That the Bedford Park Floral Company, Limited, be, and it is hereby granted exemption from taxation, other than for school purposes, upon the glass houses and other buildings used by the said Company for the carrying on of its business, the said exemption to be for a period of 15

5th. That this By-law shall come into operation on the day of the final passing thereof.

Read a first and second time and read in Committee this 18th day of November, 1920.

BY-LAW NUMBER

To provide for the raising of ninetyfive thousand dollars by way of Debentures for the purpose of the Construction of a System of Waterworks within the Municipality of Richmond Hill.

Whereas plans and specifications of the following proposed system of waterworks for the Village of Richmond Hill have been submitted to the Provincial Board of Health, namely:

A concrete dam and road widening, pump house and filtration plant complete, including pumps, piping, filters. meters, elevated tank and a distribution system over the following streets, namely, along Mill street from Trench street to Powell street, along Powell street from Mill street to Wright street, along Wright street from Powell street to Yonge street, along Trench street from Mill street to Richmond street, along Richmond street from Trench street to Yonge street, along Richmond street from Trench street westward to end of main, along Centre street from Yonge street to end of main westward, along Arnold street and Lorne avenue from Church street to end of main, along Elizabeth street from Richmond street to Arnold street, along Yonge street from Vaughan street to north Corporation boundary, along Church street from Markham street to end of main near Dufferin avenue, along Roseview avenue from Church street to Lawrence avenue, along Centre street from Yonge street to end of main eastward.

And whereas the said plans and specifications and an engineer's report of the proposed source of water supply have been approved by the said Provincial Board of Health, and

Whereas it is desirable that the said system of waterworks shall be installed, and

Whereas ninety-five thousand dollars is the amount necessary for the construction of the said system of waterworks, and

lars is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law, and Whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the Village of Richmond Hill, according to the last Revised Assessment roll of the said village is \$556,705.00, and

Whereas the General Debenture debt of the said village amounts to \$45,073.22, of which no part of the principal or interest is in arrear, and

Whereas in order to provide for the said debt it is expedient to issue Debentures of the said Corporation to the amount of ninety-five thousand dollars bearing interest at the rate of such Debentures of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year in respect of the principal shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable

for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period, and

Whereas it will require the sum of \$6,901.64 to be raised annually as aforesaid by a special rate on the whole rateable property in the said Village for the paying of the said debt and interest.

Now, therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill enacts as follows: -

1st. That the Reeve of the said Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill be, and he is hereby authorized to borrow the said sum of, ninety-five thousand dollars on the credit of the Corporation for the purposes aforesaid, and to issue Debentures of the said Corporation for the sum of ninety-five thousand dollars payable at the office of the Village Treasurer.

2nd. Within the said period of 30 years there shall be raised and levied annually by a special rate, in addition to all other rates, upon the whole rateable property of the said Village the yearly sum of \$6,901.64 for the pavment of the said debt and interest.

3rd. The said Debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within Two Years after the date on which this By-law is passed, and may bear any date within such two years and shall be payable in thirty annual instalments during the thirty years next after the time when the same are issued and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be as
