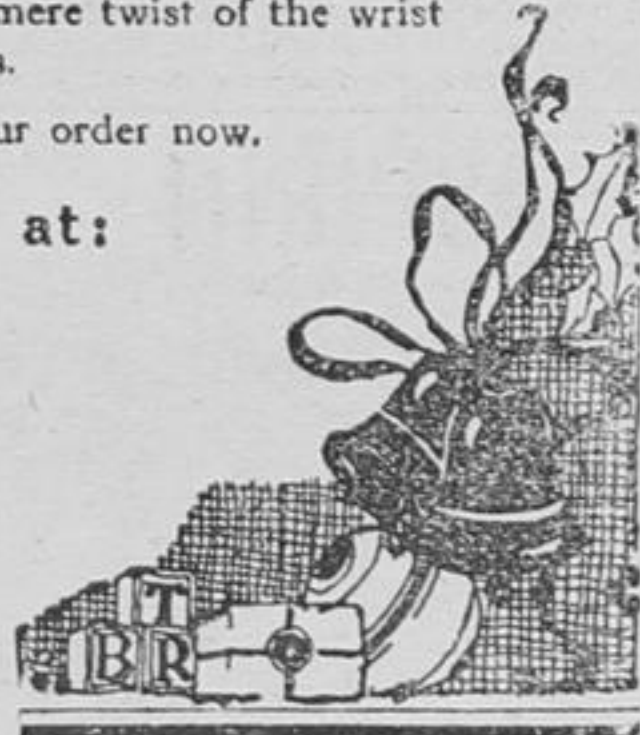

CARRIED BOTH BY LAWS

As usual, the voters of Richmond Hill did themselves credit on Monday by carrying both by-laws by substantial majorities. To carry, by a vote of nearly 5 to 1, a by-law to provide for the raising of \$95,000 for the construction of a system of waterworks, was scarcely looked for by the most sanguine well-wisher of the proposition. It was generally supposed it would carry, but not by such a large vote.

The result of the other by-law to authorize the granting of certain fixed assessments and exemptions with regard to greenhouses and other properties, was also satisfactory, carrying as it did by a majority considerably over two-thirds. No intelligent member of a Council would think of refusing these small concessions to men who were bringing prosperity to our town, therefore to vote against them now would seem like breaking faith—not only with the industries but with our Council who promised them fair dealing. But the by-law carried, as it deserved to carry.

THE GLOBE'S REVIEW

The general character and make up of the Toronto Globe of Monday was another indication as to the firm's ability and enterprise in editing and publishing a newspaper second to none in the Dominion. Business men in all parts of Canada look forward to this annual review which gives much useful and reliable information on many interesting subjects.

Among the writers who greatly assisted in making this excellent number what it is, may be mentioned Hon. E. C. Drury who rightly points out that the farming industry is worthy of encouragement. Other writers are Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance; Mr. E. W. Beatty, President of the C. P. R.; Mr. Tom Moore, President of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress; Sir Edmond Walker, Pres. Bank of Commerce; Prof. H. Mitchell of McMaster University, and other gentlemen high up in the business world.

On the whole the business outlook in Canada is exceedingly hopeful, but statistics tell the story that our imports exceed our exports by nearly \$900,000,000.

The act respecting dog tax and sheep protection, which comes into force on April 1st, next, makes it compulsory for all owners of dogs to procure numbered tags, to be supplied by the council, and for killing dogs without tags. The minimum penalty for not procuring a tag is \$10.00. County councils are authorized to pass by-laws requiring all dog tax and license fees collected after 1920 to be paid to the county treasurer, and form a sheep protection fund, all claims to be paid by the county, for which purpose county valuers are to be appointed.

1921 COUNCIL

The Council for 1921 will be the same as that of 1920 with one exception—Mr. N. Batty takes the place of Mr. J. A. Greene. Mr. Frank Sims also made a good run, and had he been elected would have made a useful Councillor. No member of the Council for several years past has worked harder, or has done more for our village, both in and out of the Council than Mr. Greene has done, but it was a case where two good men out of six had to be dropped. In fact for business and other reasons Mr. Greene announced months ago that he could not take the position for 1921, and did not consent until after the nomination.
