Capt. Wallace Dead

After a week's illness Capt. Thomas G. Wallace, M. P., for West York, died of pneumonia in St. Michael's Hospital Sunday morning. Deceased was the eldest son of the late Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, and was born in Ottawa 41 years ago. He represented West York for the past 13 years. He was of a genial disposition and was an ardent supporter of the Conservative party. The late Capt. Wallace enlisted and did service in the South African war in 1900, and was awarded a medal with three bars. Capt. Wallace was also prominent in the Orange Order and had been Worshipful Master of L. O. L., No. 28, District Master of Vaughan, and County Master of York.

The funeral on Tuesday to Christ's Church cemetery was largely attended. Among the many prominent men who attended were Premier Meighen, Senator Sharpe, Hon. G. H. Ferguson, Hon. I. B. Lucas and hundreds of others. The funeral cortege from his late farm residence was more than a mile in length, headed by the Woodbridge Band.

The officiating clergy at the public service in the hall were Bishop Sweeney, Rev. Provost Macklem, Trinity College, Rev. R. B. Patterson, and Rev. Cannon Dixon, and at the graveside in Christ Church cemetery the funeral rites of the Orange order were performed by acting chaplain, Bro. C. A. Carter.
