#### VAUGHAN COUNCIL

The council held their monthly meeting in the Township Hall, Vellore, on Monday.

Members all present, namely, J. G. Whitmore, reeve; J. T. Saigeon and W. O. McDonald, deputy reeves; G. Kellam and J. H. Robson, councillors.

The Auditor's report of the Treasurer's accounts were presented and adopted, and the clerk was instructed to have 200 copies printed for distribution.

Mr. Henry Burnett presented a claim for \$25 for a registered lamb killed by dogs, being two-thirds its value. The treasurer was authorized to pay the same.

Mr. C. Farr, representing the Latter Day Saints, asked permission to use the Township Hall for a public meeting. The request was not granted.

A number of road, gravel and general accounts were ordered to be paid.

A petition was presented requesting the council to obtain from the Hydro Power Commission an estimate of cost, to supply electric light and power to residents of the township.

A statement read showed the finances to be in a satisfactory condition. At the end of 1919 there was a deficit of over \$2,000; at the end of 1920 there was a surplus of \$5,679.95. Next meeting of council Monday, April 4.
