Finland is Prosperous.

There is no unemployment in Finland, says M. Vilijanef, chief of the Trade and Industry Department of the Finish government, who is visiting in England. He attributed Finland's good fortune in this respect, as compared to most other countries, to the prohibition of imports. This had the effect of making the country's industrial production greater than at the beginning of the war.

Finland is now considering the advisability of gradually discontinuing the embargo on imports, he said. This country has begun to transship goods for Russia and has established a free port at Hango.






