Village Council

The Council met in the clerk's office on Wednesday, May 4, with all the members present. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed. Communications were read from the following—W. W. LaChance to which the Clerk was instructed to reply, the Municipal Good Roads Association which was laid on the table, from E. A. James with reference to water-works, from the Village Solicitor giving certain information required by the Council and from Mr. Y. B. Tracey requesting the Council to make arrangements for a lamp in the C. N. Ry's station yard.

The Clerk was instructed to write the C. N. R. agent signifying its willingness to meet the Company's wish for a lamp in the station yard.

A representative of Hubbs & Hubbs real estate dealers, was present to ask the Council's approval of a plan of subdivision of the Township of Markham. On motion this was granted and the plan was signed by the Reeve and Clerk.

A number of accounts were passed and ordered paid.

Proposal To Readjust Circuits

For several years past it has been felt that, owing to the heavy work, some readjustment was necessary in the Methodist circuits in this section of York County. Consequently at a meeting held in the Richmond Hill Methodist church Friday evening delegates were present from Victoria Square, Headford, Buttonville, Thornhill, Edgely, Concord and Carville. The meeting was in charge of Rev. J. J. Ferguson, Chairman of the District, who stated that a proposition had been made to make Richmond Hill a station to support its own minister; that Victoria Square, Headford and Buttonville be formed into a circuit; also Thornhill, Edgely and Concord. Another suggestion was that Edgely be attached to Maple.

Every delegate who spoke was of the opinion that some change was necessary; that one minister could not properly take care of Richmond Hill and Victoria Square, but it was feared by some that there might be trouble in raising the necessary finances.

After a pretty full discussion from different standpoints the following resolution was carried unanimously: "Realizing the need for some readjustment to present this whole matter to our respective Quarterly Boards, and ask them to recommend to the District Meeting and the Boundaries Commission that they readjust the circuits in the interests of the whole work, as their judgment may dictate."
