Mr. Patton's Trip

An interview with Mr. Patton, who is at present visiting his parents at Elgin Mills, satisfied us that he had an interesting trip during the past nine months. Mr. Patton left Canada in September, 1920, and visited many European and African Countries, accompanying a wealthy gentleman and his family. The party motored through England and Scotland, visiting the chief cities and cathedrals en route. They left England for France and Belgium, where they visited many battlefields. Then they journeyed to Holland and Switzerland, and crossed from the latter place, over the Alps into Italy, following the Appennine range to the Lombardy plain and the ancient city of Rome. Thence they went to Naples, Florence, Bologna, Milan, Venice, Genoa, and Turin. From Italy they went by steamer to Egypt, visiting Alexandria and Cairo. Thence to Spain to the cities of Madrid, Barcelona and Senille, and returning to Southern France. From France to Goblentz, the occupied territory, and into Berlin. Mr. Patton then returned to London, and landed in New York after nine months of travel.

Thornhill 90 Years Ago

The Evening Telegram of Saturday gave a sketch of Thornhill our neighboring village to the south as she was 90 years ago. In 1830 Jerry Atkins started a milling business there, and named the place Atkins Hollow. Twenty years later a man by the name of Thorn bought out Atkins, and renamed it Thornhill. He continued the milling business and also ran a large tanery, a store and a cooperage. Thornhill was the market centre for wheat from the northern part of York County. Wagons would be lined up 200 yards waiting to unload at the mill. The flour was shipped to England. Some of the first settlers were Balsler Munshaw and Nicholas Miller. Munshaw's daughter, born in 1793, was the first white girl to be born in the County of York, north of Toronto. Nicholas Miller and Balsler Munshaw are buried in the Richmond Hill Cemetery. Thornhill was injured when the Northern Railway was built in 1853. In the early forties there were four hotels and several distilleries. The district's most outstanding landmark is the Old Anglican Church built in 1828.

Sir Henry Drayton, Finance Minister in the Meighen Government, in a recent address in Toronto, advised the women to eat only Canadian strawberries. 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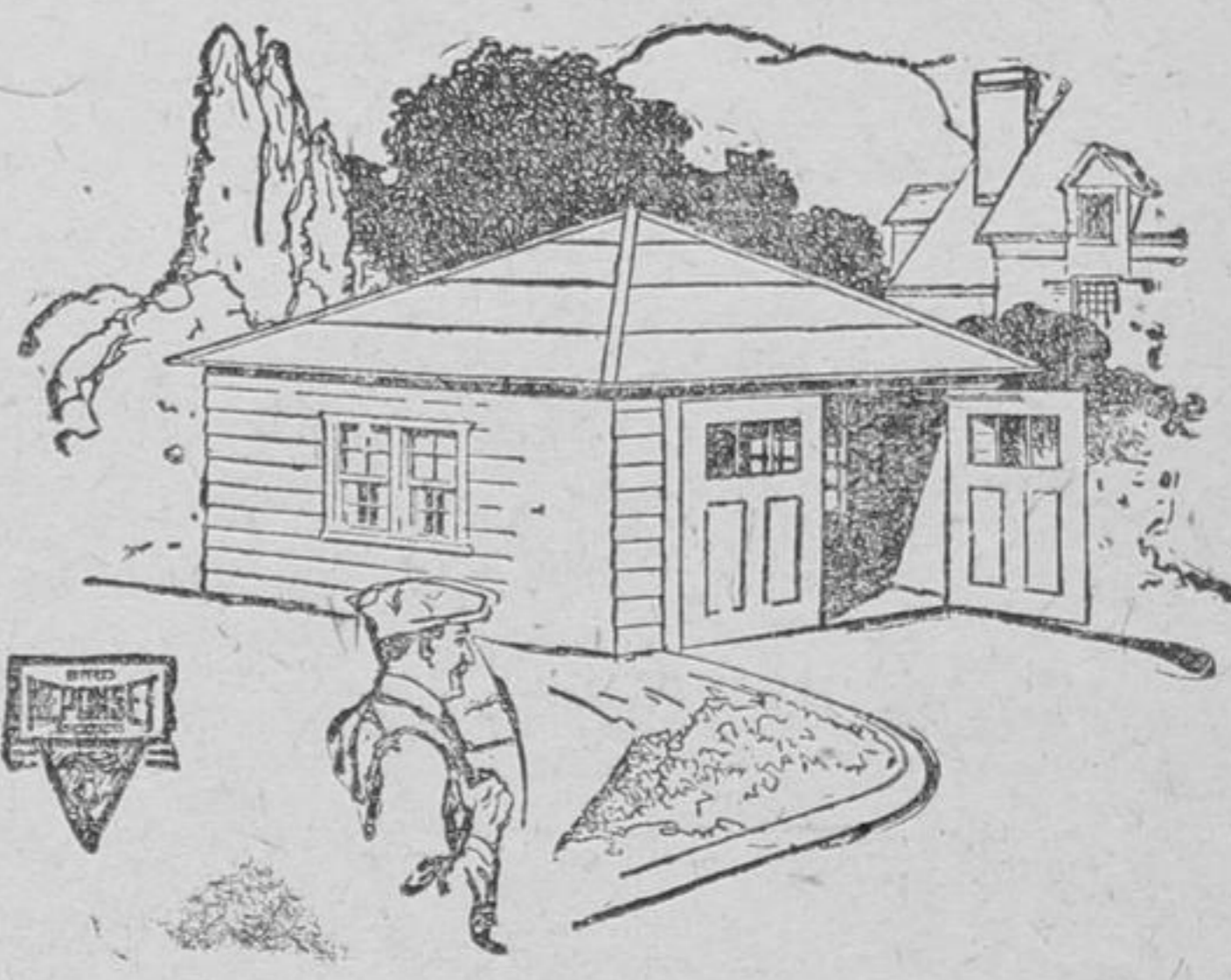
