We soon retired to our sleeping reservations and arose the next morning in the vicinity of Sudbury. In 26 hours after leaving Toronto we arrived at Fort William where our time pieces were set back one hour. The scenery up to this point is not particularly attractive although several beautiful lakes and streams are passed on the way. In fact between Fort William and Winnipeg one need not be enthused by the scenery between those two cities.

At Winnipeg we were met by an old friend, Dr. Hutchison, and spent a pleasant half hour. Proceeding westward we arrived at Calgary Sunday morning, at 10 o'clock, and were met by Mr. C. E. Going back let us say that approaching Calgary you see the snow capped Rocky Mountains more than a hundred miles in the distance. And from this point the scenery on either side becomes grander and grander. We shall not attempt to describe the grander in this letter, but shall hope to do so in a future article, suffice it to say we spent a day and night at Lake Louise, and arrived at Vancouver at 10 a. m.
