

Mehring's Foot-Power Milker



Consists of an air pump worked by foot power, two pieces of rubber hose and eight suction cups which surround the eight teats of the two cows which are milked at the same time. The operator sits between the two cows. He works the pump with his feet and places the teatcups, one by one, against the teats; on opening the spigot the suction rapidly draws the cups over the teats and the milk begins to flow from both cows toward its destination, the clean milk pail, which is hung out of the way of all dust, dirt, etc. on the spot of the pump.

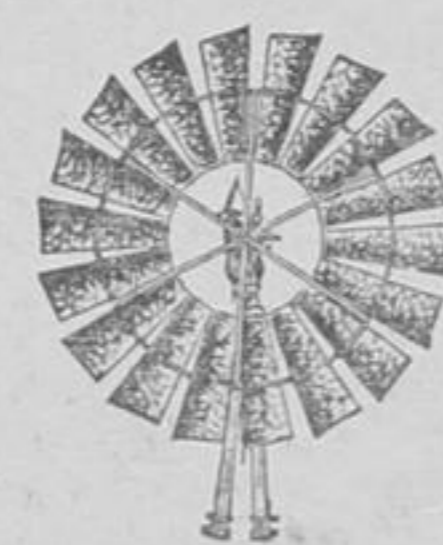

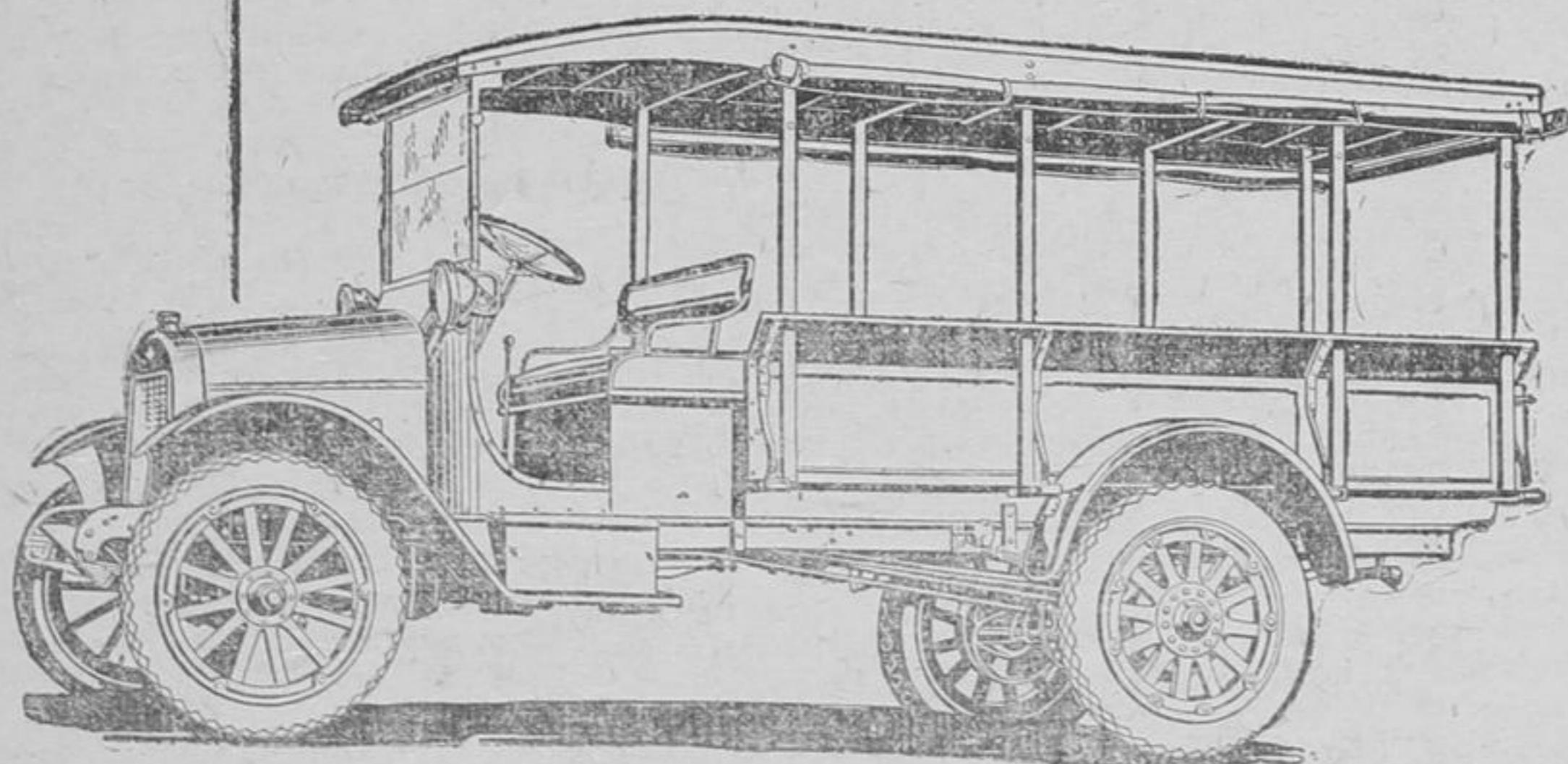
