#### Cousin of the King Dies in London

London, Sept. 11.—Admiral Louis by detachments of troops from nearby Alexander Mountbatten, first Marquis of Milford Haven, died here to-day.

The Marquis of Milford Haven, for many years the personal aide de camp to the King, was born in Gratz, Austria, in 1854, the son of Prince Alexander of Hesse, and grandson of Louis that was wrecked by the rush of II., Grand Duke of Hesse.
