#### Exceptional Educational Opportunities for War Veterans Offered By The Y. M. C. A.

Most people know something of the educational work begun by the "Y" for men overseas out of which grew the Khaki University, but it has not been generally known that this organization continues to offer special educational opportunities to war veterans. Through the United Y. M. C. A. Schools and the Canadian National Council, which is utilizing the residue from its war activities for the purpose, correspondence courses in over 200 subjects can be secured by returned men at one-quarter the regular cost. These courses cover many agricultural subjects as well as the commercial, mechanical, electrical and engineering courses and are recognized by educationalists as equal to the best.

While no one will argue for the correspondence method of instruction as against regular class work it will be readily agreed that these courses offer exceptional opportunities to men who can give only their spare time to self-improvement and who are too far from the large centres to take advantage of technical and night schools.

We would strongly recommend the returned men of this district to get in touch with S. R. Byles, County Secretary, Newmarket, who will be glad to give further information to them and to any others who are desirous of making profitable use of their leisure hours.

#### Hydro Meeting

EDITOR OF THE LIBERAL  
Sir: As your request I send a brief statement regarding the Hydro Commission and Radial Railway discussion that took place on the evening of the 14th inst.

The audience was disappointingly small; the speakers from Toronto however gave us, I think a clear practical review of these two important issues.

Mr. Elson dealt largely with the Radial Railway problem told us that by request he had attended all the sessions of the Sutherland Commission of enquiry and his own judgment entirely approved of the majority report. Experts and practical men from different places concurred in the view that Radial Railways in competition with our steam railways could not possibly be made to pay and would only result in larger deficits to our national lines. The solution of the problem that offers to electrify our National railways in Ontario which the Managers are prepared to take in hand as soon as the Hydro Commission withdraws from the Radial proposition before which time however they cannot act. Meanwhile an electric storage car is being tested with so far satisfactory results and the possibility that the storage system may go far to meet the need.

Mr. Staples dealt with the Hydro Light and Power Commission. He said that he had no wish to deny Sir Adam Beck who is a man of great ability that can be used for the benefit of our province. Developments though prove that the Commission had gone beyond its proper sphere as a body subordinate to the legislature and has obtained power that ought not to have been given to it which at times had been improperly autocratically and unwisely used. Such powers must be resumed by the legislature and the commission required to report fully as to its work and to respect needed control. Higher cost of light and power will necessarily follow the Chippawa development by which its charges must be raised.

Provincial government subsidies will lessen the cost of rural transmission lines, also development of power at various centers of the province will do much to lessen the cost of rural distribution.

Probably electrification of National railways in Ontario will consume much of the Chippawa power when it is fully developed.

I regret that mislaying of notes taken of the discussion obliges me to depend upon the mental grasp I have myself obtained of these problems which I doubt does not do justice to the speakers of the evening.

On Mr. MacGregor's assurance that he will support a thorough investigation on the tariff question, and insist on fair play for all concerned and on that efficiency in tariff matters which the community is entitled, and also on his public and private record which is now published, we feel justified in endorsing his candidature for the constituency of South York.
