### York Pioneers

It was with great pleasure we saw at the Metropolitan Station the smiling face of Mr. J. B. Watson our treasurer, who gives such painstaking attention to the finances of our society, and were glad to take seats in the car, and our tickets would be brought into us as soon as Mr. Caswell arrived with them.

We looked in vain for the familiar countenance of Mr. Wm. Street, but sickness in his family prevented him from being present.

Who are the York Pioneers anyway and we answer; they are the people who came into the country and found it a forest, and felled the trees and built a home of logs, and piled the remaining logs into heaps and burned them, and woke every morning with a strong desire to hope for the best even when they knew they had to face the worst. These are the people and may their tribe increase.

They have long ago entered into rest. We their children know nothing of their hardships. We are once or twice removed from all those times, but we meet to do them honor. We may have made our own bread, boiled our own soap, made our own candles, put our letters in a style that could be folded to address on the outside, and walked 3 miles to a P. O. and paid shillings to release the letter, but that was nothing to what the old folks had to do.

We remember when we had to knit our own stockings, and there were no sewing machines, and the apples had to be paired to last us through the winter, and we bought the candles, sixes or eights according to whether we wanted 6 to the pound or 8.

That is the kind of a world we lived in from the very first, and how delightful it was to hear the people talk of being York Pioneers.

The thing I enjoyed most was to see Mr. and Mrs. Crocker move around among the people, just as if they wanted to be sociable and Rev. C. H. Bullrop trying to impress upon us his importance because he lived near High Park, and that gave him a certain distinction, which was taken down when Houston of the Globe gave him and J. W. Doan a lesson in Geography, before they were any older.

Houston made known his intention of instructing anyone who was willing to learn, and they finally ended by all talking at once and making the matter no clearer to themselves or anyone else.

Watson and Caswell poured over tickets all the way up, quite a number had joined the society and a number had bought tickets, and after he had collected the stub ends he wanted it to come out right.

Mrs. Seldon whom I had met at the societies in Toronto, and Mrs. Hill whom I had seen at our home next accosted me, and later I learned that Miss Gardhouse a family well known to my father was on board.

One fact remains in my memory about going up, and was we were sociable and I must condense and say we had a good time.

We arrived safely and then we heard the loud notes of Dr. Hughes calling us to order as the time was limited. There was a large company gathered, where they all came from would puzzle a lawyer. It was a week later than last year and that accounted for the ladies making no preparation for the crowd after.

Dr. Hughes mentioned several items of business that had been discussed by the executive meeting, and the first was that some thorough fare leading from East to West through the city of Toronto, should be used to commemorate the name of Gov Simcoe and that we give Simcoe Street another name, and name Bloor West and East and Danforth Ave. Simcoe Street in memory of Gov. Simcoe. He said if it was our wish he would be delighted to mention it to the members of the board of control for Toronto.

There were other items but we will omit some, and merely state that 55 new members were added to the roll and that he had secured Inspector of the board of Education, and the Hon. D. L. McPherson, as members, and he wanted us to receive the whole lot with a clap. It was that you heard if you heard anything.

The treasurer Mr. Watson gave his report Current account 518 15, Rest account 574 15, Sharon account about 90. They have now 1189 and some of it is invested in Bonds.

Dr. Hughes told us the first grist mill had been built in 1792 and he had secured a piece of the sell.

He said Mr. Doherty would have been with us if the gathering had not been changed, but that it was impossible for him to come at the later date, and he had sent Inspector Elliott in his place.

Inspector Elliott spoke of the honor done him in writing him to be present and address such a large earnest gathering. He spoke of the place Dr. Hughes held on the other side of the Lakes as authority on Educational matters.

He remembered his grandmother telling him of his grandfather carrying the grain when there were no roads, by the blaze of the trees through the woods 61 miles, and bringing it home again for his grandmother to bake into bread.

He thought parents owed it to their children to hand down the history that it be not lost.

His grandmother used to sit and tell of privations we know not of. The dip in the vessel containing the oil, then the candles and the snuffers and contrast all such contrivances for lighting the home with the lamp, the gas and the electric light. The electric heater, the toaster, electric iron, the Telephone, the motor car. It would help daughters to enjoy their present.

Dr. Hughes here announced that

the September meeting would hereafter be held on the third Saturday instead of the 2nd Saturday in September at Sharon.

The next speaker was the Hon. W. D. McPherson; he said like Inspector Elliott this is my first visit to Sharon and in looking around I find that this building was erected in 1824 and I have been sincerely impressed with the artistic skill shown in this structure. How a mind like David Wilsons would mould many minds.

The building of this temple beautiful gives an index to his character. He could control his manners. He did not build for himself but for the general good, his mind needed exercise and he carried out his idea. He built for others, future generations. The more he did the more he wanted to do. Such a large building, and such a monument to a private mans memory.

We see in David Wilson who used his opportunities such an epitaph he thought for others, he lived for others and in the temple he left, he caused others to think of an unending future. The Romans built their aims, their hopes, their aspiration in bronze monument upon the hill tops to be remembered by their children.

He spoke of the duties of fathers and mothers to treasure up and hand down to their children the tales and legends of their forebears, not only to preserve past history but to make them able to enjoy their present life. He spoke of the earthen floors of ancient times where the back log was put in place by the hand spike in hands made capable.

In 1809 four provinces Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, considered it wise to unite and form a confederation, and if possible unite all the provinces in one whole. They did not have the power to do this but a little document, only 8 lines in all, was given by "Victoria Regina" stating that in the Dominion of Canada was vested the power to all the great North West.

All the land that could be worked all the timbered land, all the mineral land, all the wealth of mines, all the wealth of waters, could be used to build a line Railway over mountains, across bogs, a territory many miles of which had no population. No one to carry but the population followed the line, and the people settled, and in 5 years, the whole was completed, tell you could board a train in Vancouver and travel continuously till you landed in Montreal.

This little "Order in Council" signed by a power behind it, made it possible. The bond was light as air, strong as steel but it became a strong element a financial gain, a power to bind the East and West.

Read "Roughing it in the bush" by Mrs. Moodie to understand the aspirations the triumph, the struggles needed to give the Key to Canadian life.

It was the making of history that David Wilson worked at, and it has grown by leaps and bounds till we see how Canada has found her soul. She lives as a young nation, with her Dominion House, her Legislations her municipal bodies, in Township and the County, and to-day she sits on the Geneva board and is considering an ambassador to the U. S.

We train our men in these institutions for the higher walks in life. It is only a few years since my friend Crocker sought me out and thought I should be a member of the school board. Elect from among your worthy men or women and send them to represent you on the municipal board, or write your representative in the Legislature for needed reforms.

Dr. J. L. Hughes here mentioned Mrs. O. B. Sheppard who had done so much to make the Pioneers known. He thought the time had come when such self sacrificing work should be mentioned, and placed on record, he asked her what report she had to give, concerning the trees to make the property at Sharon a success.

Mrs. O. B. Sheppard said they promised all we wanted to make the grounds at Sharon a splendid park. We could load up our waggons and carry away all that we wanted.

It was just as we were breaking up that "Big Canoe" the Indian Chief from Georgian Island came upon the scene in full Indian costume. Altogether the day was a splendid success. If you want to join, the fee is only a dollar each year, and your eligibility for membership requires that you be born in the York district, or that you have resided there for 40 years.
