

Postage and Insurance

From October 1 the rate of postage on letters from Canada to other places in the Empire has been fixed at three cents an ounce, or fraction thereof.

The registration of parcel post will be discontinued on October 1, 1921, and a system of insurance of parcel post will be introduced, whereby parcel post in Canada, for delivery within the country which conform to parcel post regulations, may be accepted for insurance up to \$100 against loss, rifling or damage while in the custody of the Canadian Postal Service.

The scale of insurance will be as follows:

Three cents for insurance not exceeding \$5.00.

Six cents for insurance exceeding \$5.00 and not exceeding \$25.00.

Twelve cents for insurance exceeding \$25.00 and not exceeding \$100.00.

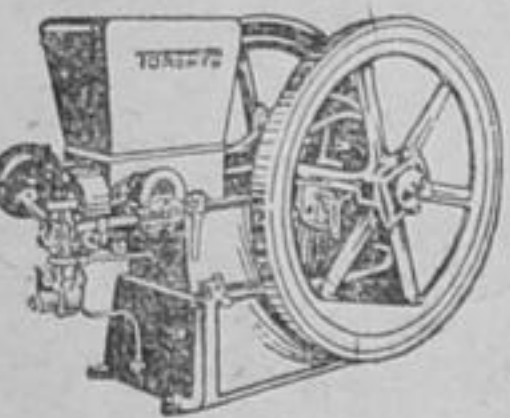
