Water Works

The elevated steel tank is more than half completed and should be finished within three weeks. The pipe-laying is more than two thirds completed and good progress is being made. Orphanage Corner Stone Laid

The main corner-stone of the Loyal True Blue and Orange Orphanage was laid by Grand Master H. C. Hocken and W. H. Banfield at St. 51 1/2, Yonge street, Elgin Mills, on Saturday, Rev. Canon Dixon opened the proceedings with prayer. Addresses were given by Hon. Justice W. R. Riddell, W. M. Fitzgerald and Controller Alfred Maguire. Members of the order were present from Ottawa, Hamilton, London, Windsor, Mount Forest and Walkerville. About 1,500 attended. Fourteen children from the Orphanage at Picton were present. The building will cost about \$197,000, of which \$113,000 has been subscribed. On Saturday \$5,618.72 was donated. W. M. Fitzgerald is President of the Board of Directors, and W. George Farley, Chief Assessor of the city of Toronto and Grand Master of the Loyal True Blues, is Treasurer.
