York Ranger Cadets

Details of the Cadet Church parade to be held on Armistice Sunday will be posted by the O. C. in the Post Office when received from Headquarters, the same being now approved by the commanding Officer.

The Drum service will not be held in the Park as previously announced. Cadets of the Protestant faith will parade to the Methodist Church and simultaneously by the Rev. Father Kelly, a special service will be conducted in the Roman Catholic Church for the cadets of that faith.

The Cadets will assemble in the agricultural grounds at one o'clock sharp and will await there the arrival of the Toronto Cadet Corps who will be accompanied by York Rangers Brass Band and Cadet Corps Bugle Band.

Should the commanding officer Col. Clarke D. S. O. M. C. not parade, the Saluting Base will be in front of the Sterling Bank.

The Senior platoon will be detailed as a squad guard under Cadet Lieut. Blaney.

Cadet officers and Cadet N. C. O's. will wear brown kid gloves for this parade.

Mrs. Greene is forming a committee for refreshments to be served to the visiting officers and Cadets after the services, in the Park. The O. C. asks for the loyal support thereto of the mothers as also all of the citizens.

Sergt. Cadet Woodhead will guide the parade.

Cadet Capt. Lasher and Cadet Lieut. Grant are detailed field officers for the afternoon.

Cadet Lieut. Hill will lead the Junior platoon. Cadet Lieut. White the Signallers and Cadet Lieut. Blaney the Seniors.

Cadet Sergt. Phipps. Cadet Sergt. Armstrong. Cadet Sergt. Dickinson. Cadet Sergt. Atkinson. Cadet Sergt. Mylks are detailed to take up the collection at the service which will be divided equally.

The Services will be conducted by the regimental Chaplain assisted by the Rev. Mr. McNeil and will be fully regimental at the conclusion the last post will be sounded as a reminder to our glorious dead.

Again the O. C. on behalf of his command asks for the loyal support of the citizens at the Park after the service the Clergy the Council and the School Board will be officially presented to Col. Clarke D. S. O. and his officers.
