## Mr. MacGregor's Platform For Agriculture

Editor Liberal:

Like all who deal with a problem they have not studied, Mr. MacGregor has dealt with Canada's basic industry in a very superficial manner. His constructive program fails to touch the real need for agricultural betterment and proves the weakness of the Liberal platform. Tariff reconstruction of a more definite and practical nature than Mr. King stands for is vital to agricultural development.

Entire omission of tariff reduction from Mr. MacGregor's program proves how entirely he fails to understand our real political situation, it is fundamental to its settlement. Many liberal candidates including practically all from Quebec refuse to approve of definite and practical reconstruction of our national policy. They are also opposed to legislation which will bring a dominion settlement of prohibition of the liquor traffic which we have so long struggled for.

If the liberal leader be our new premier, he will be so held back and handicapped by that element of his supporters as will seriously hinder if not prevent a reduction of the tariff that will be of real benefit to agricultural production, which might be doubled or quadrupled if abundant capital and labor were available for it. Without such large increase our national debt cannot be paid. The top six inches of earth must pay our national war debt.

Mr. Fielding, when finance minister failed to give the relief to agriculture that is essential to its development as it is to that of all our national resources. We dare not leave those interests to be made of by the big interests blocking reconstructive legislation. Mr. MacGregor's proposed credits, elevators and cold storage houses have already been largely won by our farmers for themselves, and they are rapidly working out further development along these lines which they can themselves accomplish.

His conception of our agricultural problems seems to be but little in advance of the lawyer minds of Premier Meighen's Cabinet, which entirely overlook the basic conditions of Canadian farm life, which have resulted in millions of acres of idle land, of thousands of empty farm houses and of depopulation of rural districts in our own province, and has sent the most active sons and daughters from our country homes to the better paid and more attractive life of our towns and cities, continuance on this course will leave our national debt unpaid.

The Rev. Dr. Cody's proposition of bringing five million of Britain's population to Canada, though in itself good, will without the long called for legislation for tariff reduction, surely result in bitter disappointment to those who might come and in long years of disillusionment for Dr. Cody and all who share in such a movement, desirable as it would be if wisely carried out.

The situation that has developed in the United States reveals what protection leads to, enormous wealth centered in a few hands in the cities while millions of the people have neither money or employment. Such causes inevitably breed bolshevik development, and by the preventing of safeguarding legislation, sooner or later lead to revolutionary movements by those who see no other way of social improvement and uplift.

In New England States there are five million acres of idle land and much more has passed into the hands of renting foreigners, who for a time will submit to the hardships and disappointments of farm life as being a little better than what they left in Europe. Food to the value of one billion five hundred million is yearly sent to new England cities from other states or from foreign lands, much of which should have been grown on her own idle lands, and which our Canadian farmers could have supplied under more friendly legislation. Mr. MacGregor needs a better platform for Agriculture.
