

The latest report in the West York equitable for the Federal nomination is that both Mr. A. J. Anderson and Mr. Len. Wallace will withdraw from the contest, and that Sir Henry Drayton will receive the nomination at a convention to be held at Weston on Saturday.

Mr. Halbert, Progressive, who represented North Ontario last session at Ottawa, takes credit for speaking against the salary grab. This is quite true; he did speak against it, but when the bill to increase the members' indemnities to \$4,000 was voted on, Mr. Halbert was absent. The vote stood 107 to 11 in favor of the raid on the Treasury. The two Progressives who voted against the increase were Crerar, the leader, and Kennedy, of Stormont and Glengarry. The other nine were Liberals, amongst whom were King and Fielding.—Economist.

The Evening Telegram of Monday, in an editorial boosting Mr. Len. Wallace for West York says:

"Len Wallace was willing to drop out provided A. J. Anderson did like-wise and a Conservative about whose principles and antecedents there was no shadow of doubt was placed in nomination."

According to the Telegram a man to be eligible as a candidate for the "National Liberal and Conservative Party" should not only have been born a Tory, but his father and grandfather should be of the same stripe.

The Toronto branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom has issued a manifesto, a copy of which has been sent to Sir Robert L. Borden at Washington, emphasizing the century and more of peace which has prevailed among the people of the New World, and praying for a continuance of the spirit of peace and good-will.

After pleading for a better understanding between Canada and the United States the manifesto concludes as follows: —

"We much regret that selfish interests are forever busy endeavoring to create prejudice, jealousy and unwholesome rivalry between these two American nations for the purpose of political advantage and commercial gain, as evidenced by certain election propaganda by reactionary forces now at work in Canada, pursuing the insane policy of promoting 'love' for one's country by hating one's neighbors. We call upon the people of Canada and the United States to repudiate such sinister influences and put their trust in nobler forces, those of international unity and good-will."

The deceased went to Newmarket to visit his daughter about two months ago and while there contracted pneumonia. He farmed for many years in King township before moving to Aurora to reside.
