### Report of Committee

The York Pioneer and Historical Society respectfully direct the attention of the Township Councils of the County of York to the general lack of attention paid to the last resting-places of the dead, not only in York County, but generally throughout Ontario; and requests the members of the Councils to take whatever steps they may think best to have the graveyards in their respective townships put in proper order, and kept in good condition. This Society would suggest that the cemeteries and grave-yards should be levelled, so that the grass may easily be cut; and that trees and flowers should be planted to make the grounds as beautiful as possible, to show due respect for the memories of the pioneers who laid so well the foundations of our country. The Councils are urged to consider the advisability of making an annual grant towards putting these graveyards in better condition, this grant to be supplemented by collections to be made in each district where there is a graveyard; and to ask the people in each district to appoint a local graveyard committee to act in co-operation with the Council. A meeting of the chairmen of the local Committees and the Council should be held each year.
