

The carrying of the whole of the 65 seats in Quebec by the Liberals not only points to the popularity of Mackenzie King in that Province, but is a mark of esteem and respect for their former leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The clean sweep of the Liberals in Nova Scotia not only shows that the Province is tired of autocratic government, but believes in government by the people. The turn over is also a well-merited tribute to the former venerable Finance Minister in the Laurier Government, who did work for the Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King and the Liberal party.

The Toronto Public School Principals' Association have made a number of radical recommendations to the Board of Education. Some of the trustees also say that a lot of valuable time is lost in taking and registering pupils' money for the penny banks, and giving out stamps and seals to be sold from house to house. The penny bank is intended to teach thrift, but parents and trustees begin to see that it is a costly nuisance in the schools.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King's victory not only in his own riding, North York, but in Canada as a whole, was nothing less than brilliant. Few of his most optimistic friends could hardly have expected that in a three cornered contest he would be elected by a majority of over 1100. One of Mr. King's opponents had been the member for two terms, and the other was the President of the Dominion U. F. O.

Quebec Province did on Tuesday what it might have done in 1911 had it not been for the alliance made by Bourassa and prominent Conservatives who made it appear that the Laurier naval programme was a scheme to induce residents of that Province to enlist and take part in the wars of Europe.

Tuesday's vote shows that the Conservative party has suffered a complete defeat. In five of the provinces of the Dominion they have not elected a single member. Mr. King has scored a great triumph in the East, and Mr. Crerar carried the Prairie provinces. The Liberals have carried 122 seats, the Progressives 60, Conservatives 51, and the Laborites 2. The result shows that the Liberals have a clear majority over all the other classes combined.

Many Barns Burned

An epidemic of mysterious barn fires is alarming the farmers in Maple and surrounding neighborhoods. A few minutes before 10 o'clock Thursday night the barns of William Burns, jun., a farmer living on the third concession of Vaughan, were discovered in flames. Mr. Burns had only time to release his stock. His season's crop, his implements, and all his buildings were destroyed. A favorable wind alone saved the house. Mr. Burns is a tenant of James Fraser of King. This is the second fire in this vicinity within a week. Early Wednesday morning neighbors notified Joshua Reid, who lives a mile south of Laskay, that his barns were ablaze. It was too late to save anything. All his stock—horses, cattle, swine and poultry—perished.

Two other fires occurred within the past month. The barns on the Murray farm were totally destroyed on October 10.

About three weeks ago an early morning fire destroyed the house and barns on the farm owned by William Glass in King township. The occupants of the house had barely time to escape. All the stock perished.

No cause has been found for any of these conflagrations.
