

We hear far too much these days about "A solid Quebec" for the Liberal party. Why don't they say "A solid Nova Scotia" or "A solid Prince Edward Island?" There were five provinces that did not return a single Conservative in the recent general elections—namely Quebec, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. And yet opponents of Hon. Mackenzie King harp only on one string—"A Solid Quebec!"

Jack Canuck states that the Meighen Government might have been more successful in the Federal elections had they taken the franchise from the alien voters, and it blames Sir Robert Borden for not advocating that policy when he was a delegate at the Imperial Conference. No doubt Sir Robert took the view that if we expect foreigners to become good, loyal citizens we must treat them as friends, and not as enemies.

Jack Canuck also points out that "No Soldier need apply" in the Western prairies for a seat in Parliament. It is not necessary, however, to go so far from home for similar examples. Even in Toronto the Conservative slogan seemed to be "No Soldier need apply!"

Jack Canuck in the last number of that edifying (?) weekly asks:

"Did you lose a dear one on the 'Lusitania'? Will you buy German toys?"

"Was one of your dear ones on a torpedoed hospital ship? Will you buy German toys?"

"Did you have one of your family poisoned by German gas? Will you buy German toys?"

Come Jack, give us a rest. It is not pleasant to look back and think of the many crimes committed by the Germans in the late war. Canadians will not go all the way to Germany for toys if they can get just as good in our own Country. It never pays, however, to be revengeful. Besides, how is Germany to pay her immense debts if she is not allowed to sell her goods in foreign countries?

After a sharp contest Mr. David Ross, the U. F. O. candidate, carried North Oxford on Monday by a majority of 1,000 over Mr. Day, the Liberal, and 3,700 over Mr. Neely, Independent Conservative. The seat was for the Local House, and this is the first time in nearly half a century that a man other than a Liberal was elected in that riding, either for the Dominion Parliament or the Provincial Legislature.
