The Council met Dec. 15, in the Clerk's office, present the Reeve and Councillors, Monkman, Batty and Hill; minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed.

Mr. F. N. Hopper was present and submitted certain questions affecting the Fire Brigade which were discussed at some length. On motion the Reeve and Fire Chief were appointed to purchase a new branch.

Mr. Sewell discussed with the Council certain alterations to be made in a plan of subdivision which had been submitted to the Council for approval.

On motion the plan was approved with the understanding that Lot 16 according to the plan is to be conveyed to the Corporation and that Bridgeford Street is to be widened by taking seventeen feet from the eastern limits of Lots 5 and 6 and that said Lot 16 is to be graded as a street.

A number of accounts were read and ordered to be paid.

The Treasurer's annual statement was presented, and on motion, the statement was received, and the Clerk was instructed to have 100 copies of the same printed for distribution.
