Standard Bank of Canada Reports Strong Position

General Business of Bank Well Maintained—Policy Has Been Followed of Making Large Additions to Reserve and Contingent Accounts—Reserve Fund Now Stand at \$5,000,000 and Paid-Up Capital \$4,000,000.

The strong position occupied by the Standard Bank of Canada is strikingly reflected by the manner in which it has been able to meet the changed conditions that prevailed in Canada during the past fiscal year.

General business was well maintained and profits were well up to the level of the previous year. As a result, the bank has continued its policy of adding steadily to its reserves and contingent funds, permitted of a balance being carried forward into the new year of \$112,492. These profits, which were computed after deducting expenses, interest accrued on deposits, rebate for interest on unmatured bills, Provincial taxes, and making provision for bad and doubtful debts, amounted to \$725,014. The balance carried forward from the previous year amounted to \$378,644, and there was received from premium on new stock issued \$148,499, making the total amount available for distribution \$1,252,157. Of this amount there was paid in dividends at the rate of 14 per cent. \$565,115, war tax on note circulation \$39,549. Reserve for Dominion income tax, \$20,000; contributed to Officers' Pension Fund, \$25,000; transferred to reserve fund, \$200,000; transferred to contingent account, \$300,000; balance carried forward, \$112,492.

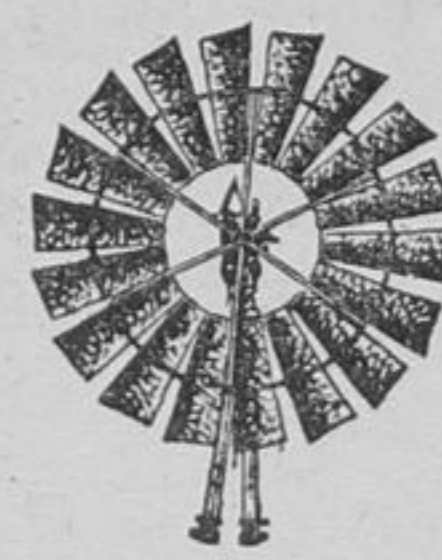
The outstanding feature of the general statement of assets and liabilities as of January 31st is the strength of the bank's liquid position. Of total assets of \$33,293,004, the liquid, or immediately available assets amount to \$35,871,868. Of this amount actual cash on hand and Dominion notes and deposit in central gold reserve total \$13,279,863, cheques on other banks \$5,151,513, balances due by banks and banking correspondents, elsewhere than in Canada, \$1,109,437; Canadian municipal securities, and British, foreign and colonial public securities, other than Canadian, \$2,843,643; railway and other bonds, \$1,202,475; call and short loans, \$2,800,230, and a particularly pleasing item is the large holdings of Dominion and Provincial Government securities amounting to \$9,029,521.

In a year of lessened industrial and commercial activity a smaller volume of current loans was to be expected. Current loans and discounts in Canada which represent the general business of the Bank amount to \$45,069,127, a reduction of \$5,000,000 from the previous year, and which is in harmony with altered conditions and is an index to the general slackening of business throughout the country.

At the same time the general deposits of the bank have been well maintained. Deposits bearing interest stand at \$51,909,455, as compared with \$53,011,997 at the end of the previous year, and deposits not bearing interest at \$13,211,230, against \$14,377,712, making total deposits of \$65,120,716, as against \$67,339,710, a reduction of only about \$2,000,000. This decrease is equal to only about 3 per cent, and would seem to indicate just how well the deposits of the bank are distributed throughout the country.

The shareholders of the Bank should be particularly gratified with the showing which has made it possible to not only continue the ample dividends but also to make such handsome contributions to Reserve and Contingent Funds. It should also prove especially reassuring to depositors that at a time like the present such a large proportion of the Bank's assets are in liquid form and invested in such high grade securities.
