Here's Who's Who (handed to the sporting editor by an admirer of the Senior Cadets):

Cecil Harding, 18 years old, goal—This is the young man's first year in league hockey, and he is certainly making good, being a cool net guardian with a reserve bundle of nerve.

Cadet-Sergt. Jack Glass (Captain), 16 years old, right wing—A stalwart boy who can skate and back-check with the best of them; stick-handles nicely, and can shoot from either side. Jack is also a regular on the senior team this year. Played with Richmond Hill last year.

Allen Armstrong, 16 years old, defence—The heavy boy on the line-up. He does not show any exceptional speed or curves, but when it comes to effective work he is on the job. As a back-checker he is a marvel, and shoots a wicked gypsum. This is his first year in league hockey.

Clarence Mykiss, 17 years old, left wing—Has plenty of speed, but his specialty is finding the nets with a quick shot from along the boards. He has been a "pinch-hitter" in this respect on several occasions. His first year in league hockey.

William Charles, 18 years old, forward—Has speed; tries hard all the way, and with a little more experience in stick-handling will be a hard check. His first year in league hockey.

Eric Blaney, 16 years old, forward—Is no speed merchant, but can stick-handle fairly well and plays his position all the while; can also stand the bumps, being a husky chap. This is his first year in league hockey.

Elmore Harding, 16 years old, forward—Is a small fellow with plenty of nerve; when opponents bump him around the ice he comes right back for more. He matches his cheek closely, and with more experience will be with the comers. First year in league work.

Charles S. Roe (Coach), 30 years old—Played the last three years with Richmond Hill seniors. Previous to that he played for years with Campbellford, Ont., his home town. The writer of this hockey column wishes to state right here that Coach Roe is deserving of great credit for the way he has built up and handled the Senior Cadets this season; they are making the best of them step lively, but not lively enough to win.

OVER ON EASY STREET

Things are calm and serene "over on Easy Street" at this writing. Last Friday night the townspeople, in large numbers, accompanied the Richmond Hill Seniors to Willowdale Arena, where the first stages in the "moving" process took place. Quite true; a certain team of "cellar champions," the York Radials, tried to block them in their efforts, but made a sorry show of it upon this occasion.
