NEWMARKET WON

The first final game for the senior championship of the Metropolitan League was played at Newmarket on Thursday evening of last week, the opposing teams being Richmond Hill, winners of the southern group, and Newmarket, winners of the northern group, the latter team winning by the one-sided score of 4-0, but the score is no indication of the play, Richmond Hill playing the better brand of hockey from the start to the finish of the game; that is, according to the writer's honest opinion. Quite true, Newmarket was without the services of their star player, McCaffrey, but his absence was more than made up for by the sensational work of their goalkeeper. Ransome was good, saving the nets time and time again, but the other fellow—he was simply unbeatable at all times; he stopped our boys shots from all angles, and Grady and Kenny each sent him a number of good ones.
