In Memoriam

There was quite a gloom, cast over the village of Gormley on Tuesday morning, May 9th, when we heard of the sudden death of John J. Snider, of heart failure, as he had been at the revival services which are being held here. Just the evening before he had reached his 77th year, and yet he was always busy, giving a helping hand to every one in need of help.

While he had not united himself with any body of believers, he was a great church goer, often attending three church services and two Sabbath Schools on one Sunday; also all the prayer meetings in the neighborhood. His last testimony was, "My Jesus I Love Thee, I Know Thou Art Mine." He was married to Miss Sarah M. Prentice, of Carryville, Nov. 6th, 1871. To this union were born five children, Albert A. Snider, Pinewood, Ont., Mrs. James Tilson, Pinewood, Ont., Mrs. Chas. Whitney, Toronto, Mrs. John Baker, Carryville, and Sarah who died in infancy.

His first wife died May 10th, 1883. On April 7, 1885, he was married to Miss Melinda Cober, of Concord. To this union were born four children, Mrs. Thos. Johnson, Gormley, Ont., Peter Clarence, who died March 19, 1913, John Geo. Snider, Edgely, Cora Snider, Gormley.

Mrs. Gee's Death

After a long and serious illness, Mrs. Geo. Gee, passed away Friday, May 12, at her home, Centre Street east.
