## York Ranger Cadets

Friday Evening June the 9th, the Corps will be inspected by Lieut. Col. Huggins D. S. O., M. C., at 8 o'clock Standard Time, in the Agricultural Grounds, and to which the Corps cordially invite the public to attend. The Grand Stand will be opened at 7.30 o'clock sharp.

The York Ranger Brass Band, 30 strong from Toronto, will arrive by special car at 7.30 o'clock sharp. Cadet Sergt. Woodhead is detailed to be the official Guide on their arrival, the line of march being up Yonge to Centre, Centre to Church, Church to the Review Grounds.

On the arrival of the inspecting Officer at 8 o'clock the public will kindly stand to the National Anthem for the General Salute, after which the Inspection will follow.

For the Manual of Arms Cadet Lieuts Bert Grant and Eric Blaney will drill their respective Platoons. Cadet Lieut. White and his Signaller demonstrating Signalling. Cadet Capt. George Lasher will carry on with Company Drill while Cadet Lieuts. Hill and Phipps will act as Field Orderlies. The Cadet Sergeants will be lined up at the rear for special inspection and presentation for their respective athletic record. The Cadet Debating Club will also be lined up and during the Review Cadet Sergt. Martin will render the "Bugle Calls".

After the Grand March past, the Seniors the Juniors and the Cubs will change into their sporting outfits as also white regimentals, the Cubs demonstrating to the Inspecting Officer, physical drill under the O. C. Will the mothers of the Cub Cadets kindly see that their boys' white duck trousers are specially laundered for this parade.

At the close of the Inspection refreshments will be served to the visiting Officers, the band and to the Cadets, in the form of sandwiches and ice drink, in good old army style.

His Worship the Reeve, the Councillors, the Clergy and School Board will be presented to the visiting Officers during the changing of the Baseball Teams and the Cubs for their special parade. Field Orderlies detailed will at this time report to the O. C. for instructions and carry on, as the Cub Platoon demands his personal supervision and care.

Church Parade, on Sunday Morning of the 11th, Cadets of the Roman Catholic Faith will parade with the O. C. and Cadet Lieut. Bert Grant to the Morning Celebration of the Mass in honour to the Rev.
