Dr. N. Ley Harris Leaves Widow and Four Children

The following account relative to the death of Dr. Ley Harris is taken from The San Angelo Daily Standard of May 10, 1922.

"Dr. N. Ley Harris, the optician, died at 8:15 o'clock Wednesday morning at the family residence, corner South Bishop and Live Oak streets. Funeral services held at the Massie Company undertaking parlors at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon the Rev. F. B. Buchanan of the First Methodist Church officiating. Interment in Fairmount.

Doctor Harris was 41 years old, having been born in Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada, November 27, 1880. For many years he resided at Hawthorn, New Jersey. In 1914 he came to San Angelo purchasing the optical business conducted by Dr. Fred R. Baker at 9 East Twohigh avenue. Besides the widow he leaves four children: Angelica, Ida, Normalee and N. Ley, Jr. One child, Alma Ruth, died a year ago last December. His mother resides at Woodstock, Ontario, Canada. A sister, Mrs. C. W. Cooper, lives at Winnipeg, Canada.

Dr. Harris was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and a member of the local Elk Lodge. He was a member of the International Optometrist Association, of the New Jersey Optical Association and of the Texas Optical Association. Doctor Harris held an enviable reputation as an optician.

His most intimate friends and neighbors speak of Dr. Harris as tender and affectionate terms, and beautiful memories of him will long remain. One friend writes: "His was a rare and gentle spirit, a brilliant mind and a magnetic personality that made him beloved of many friends."

Jasper Park Lodge opened

Jasper Park, Alberta, June 15th—With the unfurling of the Union Jack by Mrs. H. C. Fleming of San Francisco, the first guest to register, and hoisting it into position in front of the main building by Mr. John M. Inrie of the Edmonton Journal, Jasper Park Lodge was opened to the public today.

The importance of this event is chiefly in the fact that it is the first step to be taken by the Canadian National Railways in providing permanent buildings for the accommodation of tourists in this splendid mountain playground, set aside by the Dominion Government, consisting of 4,400 square miles in the heart of the Northern Canadian Rockies. The assembly for the opening represented guests from Australia, United States, Pacific Coast points, the Prairie Provinces and Eastern Canada. The lodge is of artistic log construction, including a large lounge building, dining hall and separate sleeping quarters.

Resident of Ypsilanti for Twenty-Three Years to be Buried at Birthplace

Mrs. Margaret Hood Drury, wife of Dr. James Drury, passed away at her home on Ferris St. last night at 11:45 o'clock after an illness of about three months.

Mrs. Drury was born in Markham, Ont., 58 years ago and came to Ypsilanti 23 years ago as a bride. Her father and mother both were of Scotch birth, and she was of a fine family.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Drury is survived by five sisters and two brothers, all living in Canada. Two of her sisters, Miss Agnes and Miss Elizabeth Hood, were with her during her last illness.

There will be a short service at the home tonight at seven o'clock, conducted by Rev. Elliott of the Presbyterian church where Mrs. Drury belonged. Saturday morning Dr. Drury and the Misses Hood will leave with the body for Markham, Ont., where she will be buried in the Hood family lot in St. Johns Presbyterian cemetery.
