York Scores Again

The Inter-County Junior Farmers Field Day which was held at Brampton on June 29th was a decided success. Seven Counties were represented with teams, all of which eagerly competed in an exceptionally interesting programme of sports.

Just before the hour scheduled to commence, a cloud of dust swept down on the Fair Grounds. It did not settle. It encircled the race track several times, led by the daring "Duckie" in his latest racing model. After gentle but firm protests from Jack Steckley, the motor demonstration ceased, not before York Junior Farmers made it quite emphatic that they were there to raise a dust and the other Counties would be obliged to enjoy it the remainder of the day.

The spirit of true athletes prevailed throughout. Although York County had the greater number of contestants, every event was well represented by very able athletes from other Counties. Superior training and condition stood the York boys in good stead in the finals, and it was not unusual to see the first five to finish score for the home county.

And the final score, well we shall divulge this information if you promise not to jolly the young farmers from other Counties. York scored one hundred and thirty points, more than the total of the other six counties. It would be unjust to single out for individual mention any of the young men or women responsible for this very creditable showing. However it was decided by points that the outstanding lady athlete was Miss Edna Snider, with 15 points and Miss P. Campbell following closely with 14 points. Mr. V. Orr was high man with 20 points, followed by Mr. E. Campbell with 17 points.

The medals, shield and ribbons were presented by Mr. Bert Roadhouse at conclusion of the events.

JASPER PARK LODGE
AN IDEAL STOP-OFF POINT

With the advent of reduced fares to Alberta and British Columbia points, many who have long anticipated seeing the Canadian Rockies and Pacific Coast will make the journey this year. To them, and to the individual travelling "Across Canada" for purely business reasons, the "National Way" and the Canadian National Railways' premier trains, the "Continental Limited" and the "National" appeal most strongly, the route connecting as it does the great urban centres of Canada, and traversing regions of outstanding interest. The various Canadian National hostelies en route suggest excellent stop-off points and are noted for the excellence of their service. To their number is added this year Jasper Park Lodge on Lac Beauvert.

Jasper Park, Alberta, in the Canadian Rockies, is the largest of Canada's National Parks, its area of 4,400 square miles offering unlimited holiday possibilities to the Tourist and the Sportsman. Dolley Varden trout lurk in the clear pure mountain streams. Beautiful transparent lakes mirror the encircling mountains, and a new unspoiled Alpine wonderland of snow-crowned peaks and verdant valleys gladdens the eye. In this delightful setting on Lac Beauvert, three miles from Jasper Station (with which it is connected by motor car service), is Jasper Park Lodge, operated by the Canadian National Railways' Hotels Department, and now open for the reception of guests.

Of artistic log construction, the Lodge comprises a large, comfortable Lounge building, surrounded by Dining Hall and separate sleeping buildings, each containing sitting-room and four bedrooms, electric lighted, with all modern conveniences, running water in each room, baths etc. In conjunction with the Lodge is a Dancing Pavilion where good music assures to the guests delightful evening diversion.

From the Lodge a magnificent panorama greets the eye. Mount Edith Cavell, so-called in memory of the martyred British Red Cross Nurse, stands out in bold relief, its glinting slopes making it to appear as "a sheet suspended from the heavens." The picturesque valley of the Athabaska is flanked by Pyramid Mountain, the richness of its varied color effects presenting a very striking contrast. Whistlers Mountain, Colon Range, Roche Bohomme, are but a few of the mighty peaks that meet the gaze. Riding is, of course the popular pastime and ponies are available for this exhilarating sport. Within easy reach of the Lodge, afoot or by motor car, are numerous points of interest. Maligne Canon and Gorge, one of the most interesting attractions in the Park, is but six miles distant. Easily accessible streams will tempt the fisherman. The amateur photographer will revel in Nature's bounteousness. Animal, bird and plant life is found in wonderful variety. Seventy different species of birds, seven hundred different species of plants and flowers have been accounted for, and within the confines of the Park which is a bird and game preserve are big horn mountain sheep and goat; bear-cinnamon, brown and black; caribou and moose, elk, beaver, otter, marten and deer.

For those more venturesome, who would explore the difficult and extended trails, guides, ponies, pack-horses and complete outfits can be obtained at the Lodge, from which point also parties set out on hunting expeditions beyond the confines of the Park.

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GOOD WORK AT FAIR PRICES
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Meeting of the Board of Health

The Board of Health requests the following:— That persons intending to put in septic tanks apply to Mr. Hume, clerk of the village, for a permit. The idea is to have the regulation tank put in, with proper location and distribution of soil pipes. That persons wishing to sell milk or who are now in the business obtain a license from the Clerk of the village not later than August 20. Copies of the by-law will be furnished to those registering. Fee \$1.00. Those wishing to keep hogs obtain a permit from the village Clerk. It is the intention of the Board of Health to restrict the keeping of hogs to outlying, thinly settled parts of the village.

There is an epidemic of measles in this locality suspicious cases require to be diagnosed and reported in order that the houses be placarded and the disease stamped out.

FLY-FOOT PRINTS—A few facts, figures and flirtations of the house fly:—

The fly is a very diligent animal. He spends much of his time around the horse stable and pig pen raising his brood, always bringing up a large family.
