The Board of Health requests the following:-

That persons intending to put in septic tanks apply to Mr. Hume, clerk of the village, for a permit The idea is to have the regulation tank put in, with proper location and distribution of soil pipes

That persons wishing to sell milk or who are now in the business obtain a license from the Clerk of the village not later than August 20. Copies of the by-law will be furnished to those registering. Fee \$1.00

Those wishing to keep hogs obtain a permit from the village Clerk. It is the intention of the Board of Health to restrict the keeping of hogs to outlying, thinly settled parts of the village. There is an epidemic of measles in

this locality suspicious cases require to be diagnosed and reported in order that the houses be placarded and the disease stamped out.
