Grading and Packing Rules
—OF—
British Columbia Red Cedar Shingles
GENERAL RULES OF MANUFACTURE
Color of Wood shall be No Defect.
XX-6/2-16—
6" or 8" clear butts and better. Random widths, but no shingles narrower than 2". No shingles less than 14" long allowed. When dry 25 courses shall measure not less than 72".
All 16" 6/2 shingles shall be packed 25/25 courses. Laid 5" to the weather each bundle will cover 31 1/2 square feet.
XXXXX-5/2-16—
Five butts to measure not less than 2" green. Must be strictly clear, vertical grain, smoothly sawn, and otherwise well manufactured. No sap or shims allowed. Random widths, but no shingles narrower than 3". When dry 20 courses shall measure not less than 72".
