Century Farm Sold

Mr. Arthur Elson, of Gormley, has sold his farm of 100 acres, lot 13, con. 3 w, Markham, known as the Century Farm, to Mr. T. Flett, of Peterboro, for \$17,500. This farm has been in the Elson family for five generations. Mr. Elson's great grandfather receiving the original deed from the crown over 20 years ago. Besides being a direct descendant himself of the pioneers who came from Genesee and settled in Markham towards the end of the 17th century, Mr. Elson's wife is a sister of the late J. J. Lunan, whose forefathers settled in Markham in 1792 or 1793. The Elson's have purchased a home for themselves on Roseview avenue, Richmond Hill, and will move thither about the first of March when Mr. Flett gets full possession of the farm.
