The open season for hunting deer and moose in Northern Ontario is rapidly approaching. South of the French and Mattawa rivers Nov. 5th to Nov. 20th inclusive; north and west of these rivers, Oct. 25th to Nov. 30th, inclusive. North of the Transcontinental Railway Line the season is from Sept. 15th to Nov. 15th inclusive.
