OAK RIDGES

Residents of Oak Ridges are determined to make an effort to once more secure commuters' rates on the Metropolitan Railway. At a meeting of the local Ratepayers' Association held recently it was decided to cooperate with Aurora, Newmarket, Thornhill, and kindred associations with this end in view. Accordingly it was planned to hold a public meeting in the Oak Ridges Schoolhouse on Wednesday, January 10. Representatives of all the associations in the vicinity of upper Yonge street are expected to attend the meeting, as the question to be dealt with is one of vital interest in the district.

Resolution

At the last meeting of the Women's Institute the following resolution was unanimously carried: "That the Women's Institute pay over \$280 the proceeds of the Hallowe'en Party to the Secretary of the Memorial Fund, and that they place themselves on record as being willing to endorse whatever form of Memorial is decided on by this community." The Women's Institute also hope that all those who contributed to the Hallowe'en Party on the understanding that the proceeds were to be for Memorial Hall, will approve the above resolution.

Re Memorial

Arrangements have been made to take a vote on Jan. 1st next, on the question of the form of Memorial our Village shall erect. This will be taken at the same time and in the same place that the Municipal Elections are held viz in the Masonic Hall from nine a. m. to five p. m.

The persons qualified to vote on this question will be those residing in Richmond Hill who are qualified to vote at Municipal and Provincial Elections, in other words, every person who is a resident of the Village, whose name is on the Voter's Lists and is of the age of twenty one years is entitled to vote, women as well as men.

Persons who do not reside in the Village, but who are assessed as Freeholders or Leaseholders on the last Revised assessment Roll, are also entitled to vote.

The names of persons qualified to vote at Provincial Elections only, do not appear on the printed Voter's List which has been distributed to Electors. These names are on a written list in the possession of the Village Clerk, which will be available on the day of the voting.
