By-Law Number

Of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill.

To build, construct and equip a new high school for the said Village of Richmond Hill, and to purchase grounds for a site for the same.

WHEREAS the Board of High School Trustees for the said Village of Richmond Hill, deem it necessary and expedient to build, construct and equip a new high school for the said Village of Richmond Hill, at an approximate cost of One hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) said sum to include the price of land for a site of said Building.

AND WHEREAS the said Board of High School Trustees have applied to the Council of the Village of Richmond Hill, for the sum of One hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to build and equip the said school, and to purchase land as aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS the said Council of the said Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill have disapproved of the said application.

AND WHEREAS by R. S. O. 1914, Chapter 268, Section 38, Subsection 5, and Amending Acts, on the request of the Board of High School Trustees, after an application has been disapproved of by the Council, the said Council shall submit the application to the vote of the electors of the said Municipality.

AND WHEREAS the said Board of High School Trustees have requested the Council to submit the said application to the vote of the ratepayers of this Municipality.

THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF RICHMOND HILL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:-

(1) That a new high school be built, constructed and equipped in the said Village of Richmond Hill, on the land and premises situate on the North side of Wright Street in the said Village and more particularly described in the grant thereof at a cost of One hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) payable in 30 years. The said building and equipment to be according to the plans and specifications deposited by the Board of High School Trustees now on file with the Clerk of this Municipality.

(2) That the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill, grant to the said Board of High School Trustees of the said Village of Richmond Hill, the said sum of One hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) for the purpose of building, constructing and equipping the new high school as hereinafore set out, including the cost of the land hereinafore referred to as a site.

DATED at the Village of Richmond Hill, this 15th day of January, 1923.
