### Re New High School

Editor LIBERAL

Dear Sir:-

In 1920 we raised for High School purposes \$3019.00

In 1921 to which the doctor referred I have no record, so am taking the last statement available.

For year 1923, the board have asked Council for.....\$ 5000 00  
Add to this extra for heating new school..... 500 00  
extra for caretaker..... 500 00  
extra for insurance..... 200 00  
extra for sundries..... 150 00  
extra for new teacher..... 1800 00  
extra for debenture..... 2421 00

1923 if we had a new school our share.....\$10,571 00  
1920 we paid.....\$ 3019 00  
and I think I have underestimated it. The county will pay 80% of maintenance if the county attendance is 80% of total attendance; if the attendance is reversed, we will pay 80% and the county 20%.

The county pays 3/4 of cost of building, but if the lower part of county should be incorporated into a city called The City of York, it would take off approximately 1/2 of the assessable property of the county, and this third would have to be taken care of by the rest of the county including ourselves. In thirty years the amount of money collected from the taxpayers of this village and the county to pay for a school costing \$100,000 would be \$217,000, our share would be \$72,333 almost 3/4 of the cost of the original building, over seventy two thousand dollars to be collected in taxes from the village during the next thirty years.

I would ask the members of our School Board to submit another plan out of the present difficulty. I have confidence in them and expect them to provide the best their brains and skill in such matters can give. To carry out with the tools we have largely and by skillful use of what we possess, tide us over a period until our population has increased considerably and some of the debt already incurred has been reduced.
