 sermon and music.

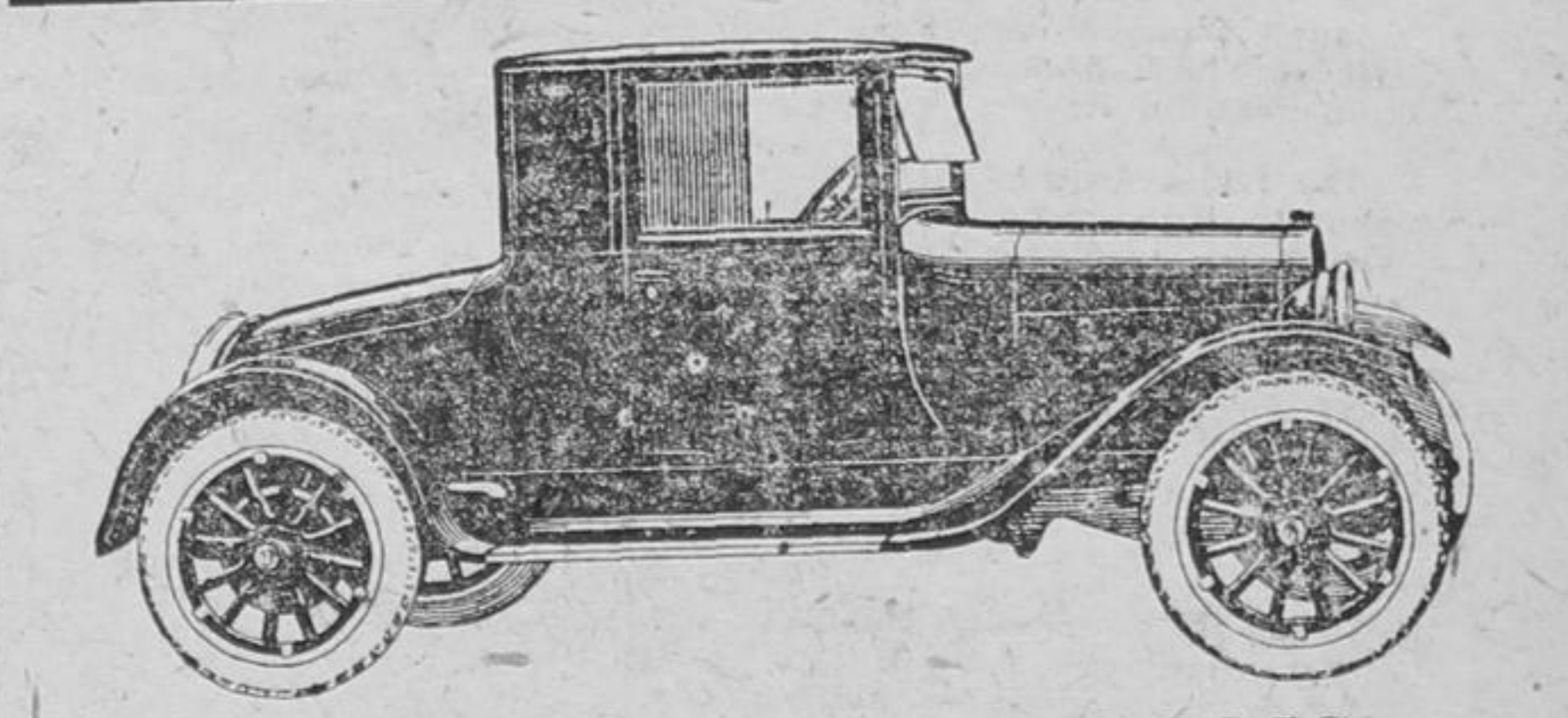
**NEWMARKET**  
 James C. Brody of Newmarket was  
 found dead in his house on Saturday  
 morning by neighbors. Mr. Brody had  
 left his place of business the previous  
 evening in his usual health. When he  
 failed to put in an appearance the  
 next morning, his partner, W. A.  
 Brunton became anxious, and tele-  
 phoned to a neighbor of Mr. Brody's,  
 who went to call him and found him  
 dead in a chair, with an evening paper  
 beside him, and the light burning.  
 Mr. Brody was born in Newmarket  
 52 years ago, and had lived here all  
 his life. For some years he conducted  
 a general store in partnership with his  
 brother-in-law. Disposing of the  
 business, he became associated in  
 business with W. A. Brunton. Mr.  
 Brody was an enthusiastic sportsman.  
 In his youth he had been a lacrosse  
 player of considerable note, and in  
 later years took up bowling. He was  
 a member of the Methodist Church.  
 Mr. Brody is survived by his wife,  
 who is in the Toronto General Hospital;  
 one son, Carl, and two daughters, Mrs.  
 Clarence McQuig and Miss Claiice  
 Brody, all of Toronto.

**Have You Met Him?**  
 Under the heading "Have you met  
 him?" The Globe of Tuesday has a  
 photogravure of Mr. David James of  
 Thornhill, with a short account of his  
 busy life as follows:  
 Five generations of the James family  
 have passed through the Thornhill  
 School, and David James has  
 known them all. He is the link that  
 connects Thornhill of the present with  
 the flourishing settlement which, in  
 early eighteen-hundreds, had every  
 promise of becoming a busy manu-  
 facturing centre. He is also the  
 historian of his district. Not only has  
 he chronicled events of early days, but  
 has kept track of the weather, and the  
 yearly progress of the crops as well.  
 At the present time Mr. James is the  
 oldest correspondent of both the  
 Federal and Provincial Departments of  
 Agriculture. Thirteen years as Reeve  
 of Markham township gave him an  
 intimate knowledge of municipal mat-  
 ters, and no one else in York county  
 has so intimate a knowledge of the  
 men who, in the early days, guided the  
 affairs of York. Reforestation is one  
 of his hobbies, and one may lose his  
 way in a bush lot he planted out a few  
 years ago.
